maintained a secret, but the official said "don't be surprised" if it agrees to widen proposed four-power talks on Berlin to cover several other German problems.

Russia Gains Objective

The Russian-licensed German press has implied repeatedly that the Soviets are using the Berlin blockade as a lever to gain four-power talks on all of Germany. Russia and seven of her satellite nations called for such talks at the meeting of their foreign ministers in Warsaw last month.

Air activity quickened in Britain under the impact of the Berlin crisis. The air ministry ordered large-scale Royal Air Force exercises over Southern England for Sunday in conjunction with a test of Britain's wartime air raid observation service.

In Berlin, the Russians arrested two U. S. military policemen who drove by "mistake" into the Russian zone. The provost marshal said "we are in contact with the Russians now and expect that they will be released soon."

Sees Impediments to Reds
The French-licensed newspaper Der Kurier, in Berlin, claims Russia could not launch a blitz against the Western zones of Germany even if she wanted to.

"Dismantled rail lines east of the Elbe and deteriorated bridges would hold up the advance of motorized columns," the paper asserted.

It added that the Russians would be hampered by long communication lines, and quoted German railway men as saying that Soviet supply trains still are harassed by bands of guerrillas in the former Polish Ukraine.

Der Kurier also quoted returning German war prisoners as saying the Russian people had no zest for war and that the Soviet Army in Germany was "worried about the relatively great number of deserters."

Rodeo Clown's Wife Gets Divorce on Fraud Charges

RENO, Nev., July 22.—(AP)—Rodeo Clown Holcomb's seven-month-old marriage was annulled here Tuesday.

Mrs. Helen L. Dutra Holcomb, formerly of Los Angeles, obtained a decree of annulment on grounds she was induced into the marriage last Dec. 9 by "fraud and misrepresentation."

Mrs. Holcomb said in her complaint that the clown told her he had a home and could support her in reasonable comfort. After a month of marriage, however, she found he had no money or assets and was heavily in debt, she charged. They haven't lived together since then, the complaint said.

Holcomb denied her assertions in a formal answer. His home was given as Clayton, Wash.

Wage Hike Averts Strike Against Ford Motor Co.

DETROIT, July 22.—(AP)—A 13-cent-an-hour wage increase for 116,000 CIO production workers today erased a national strike threat against the Ford Motor Company.

Climaxing more than 21 hours of nearly continuous negotiation, the CIO United Auto Workers also won increases in premium pay, vacation improvements, and a group insurance plan revision. The union estimated these "fringe" benefits would total an additional 3½ to 4 cents an hour.

The UAW-CIO also estimated the annual increased cost to Ford of the new contract at \$32,000,000. The firm made no estimate. The revised contract expires July 15, 1949.
