**Officers in Navy Reserve May Have Permanent Status**

WASHINGTON, July 22.—(AP)—The Navy for the first time since June 30, 1942, has authorized permanent appointments for officers in the Navy Reserve, effective August 1. About 292,000 officers in the Reserve will be affected.

The result will be to place the permanent rank structure of the reserve on a basis paralleling that of the regular Army. This stabilization will permit Reserve officers to become eligible for future promotions at the same time as their regular Navy contemporaries.

It is estimated, for example, that about 20,000 reserve ensigns will become eligible for promotion to lieutenant (junior grade) this year.

Reserve officers will be permanently appointed to the highest grade, exclusive of restricted "spot" appointments, in which they serve satisfactorily on active duty under temporary ap-

**Chinese Girl Claiming 9-Year Fast Found FAKER**

NAUKING, July 22.—(AP)—Yang Mei, 20, who swore she hadn't eaten for nine years, was exposed today by the official Central News Agency as a midnight pantry raider.

The agency said nurses, feigning sleep at the Chungking Hospital where the girl has been under observation for weeks, caught her slipping into the pantry to feast.

She had insisted she lost all appetite for food nine years ago after an illness. Her pretense had won her, news droppers, a permanent wage and widespread publicity—plus midnight snacks of split chicken heads (a Chinese delicacy), pork and potato stew, rich porridge, cooked rice, pickled dried beans and other food.

The news agency two days ago said food particles were found between her teeth by a dentist.

**Neuner's Ruling O. K.s Funds For College Projects**

SALEM, Ore., July 22.—(AP)—Attorney General George Neuner has ruled that higher education building funds can be used to construct walks and sidewalks at Oregon State College, grade and landscape a housing project at the University of Oregon, build barns, and an R. O. T. C. gun shed at O. S. C.

The state emergency board and board of control had approved these projects subject to the attorney general's approval. The money comes from the higher education building fund approved by the people three weeks ago.

The boards last Tuesday granted \$62,000 for the road and sidewalk project at O. S. C. Neuner upheld this on grounds the roads and sidewalks were to be built in connection with new buildings being constructed on the campus.

As for the other three projects, Neuner said they can be constructed without advertising for bids, because the work is to be done under supervision of the Higher Education Board's own engineers and with use of salvage materials.

**Roseburg Minister Gets Free Methodist Post**

PORTLAND, July 22.—(AP)—The Oregon Free Methodist Conference voted yesterday to consolidate the direction of their districts, and elected the Rev. J. R. Stewart, Salem, as conference superintendent.

Previously, Stewart had been in charge of the Salem and Rogue River districts, while the Rev. D. L. Fenwick directed the Portland District. Fenwick will now be available for a pastoral appointment.

Officers elected at the organization session included the Rev. Kenneth Harger, Roseburg, statistical secretary.

**'Truth Serum' Banned For Slayer of Wave**

SEATTLE, July 21.—(AP)—Hospital doctors have been refused permission to administer "truth serum" to Vernon S. Allen, former Spokane man now held in the slaying of Lt. Comdr. Margaret Jones, senior Wave commander of the 13th naval district.

Detective Sgt. Irving O'Mera said Allen's attorneys had requested the refusal.

Allen, now recovering at King County hospital from a neck wound, appears to remember nothing about the slaying, O'Mera said.
