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## Evangelist To Speak Saturday At Baptist Church

Don Winters, young evangelist from Ohio, will speak at the Roseburg Baptist Church on Saturday, July 24, at 8 p. m.

While in his early teens and a sophomore in high school, Winters ran away from home and went to Grand Rapids, Mich. There, after working for some time, he continued his high school work. Popular as a leader he became the president of the Older Boys Conference of the state of Michigan, an organization of 18,000 boys. Upon completing high

school he returned to Ohio to seek employment, and back in his home state was converted.

After a period of personal work he attended Moody Bible Institute and Kent State University in preparation for further Christian service. For eight years he served as a pastor, but in September 1945 gave up his church in order to give full time to evangelistic work.

Mr. Winters is a popular Youth for Christ speaker in the East and is much in demand for evangelistic meetings.

## Japanese Sues to Regain American Citizenship

SEATTLE, July 22.—(AP)—Kiyoshi Kawaguchi, born in Seattle of Japanese parents in 1919,

wants to regain his American citizenship.

In a federal court action filed against Secretary of State George C. Marshall, Kawaguchi said he had been denied entry to the United States by the U. S. Consul General in Tokyo on grounds he had chosen Japan as his country in 1943.

Kawaguchi said he left Seattle for Japan in 1938 to study. The next year he renounced his dual citizenship in favor of the United States. He said he later resumed his dual citizenship because in wartime his employer refused to hire him unless he was a Japanese citizen.
