Record Expansion of Irrigation, Hydroelectric Power Resources In West Programmed by Bureau

GRAND LAKE, Colo., July 17.—(AP)—Reclamation Commissioner Michael W. Strauss announced yesterday a \$250,000,000 all-time record construction program for expanding Western irrigation and hydroelectric power resources during the next 12 months.

The schedules outlined at a meeting of reclamation bureau officials from Washington and 17 western states "are pointed to irrigating an additional 125,000 acres and producing 260,000 more kilowatts of power during the fiscal year, Strauss said.

The conference also projected subject to congressional financing—construction on authorized projects for the next six years which contemplates water for an

additional 4,250,000 acres and 2,500,000 more kilowatts of hydroelectric capacity by 1955.

Strauss said that the appropriation bill as passed by Congress forced the bureau to strike from the program certain transmission lines, switchyards and power facilities.

In the land to be irrigated by next June 30, Strauss said, will be from 25,000 to 30,000 acres—about 500 farms—which will become available for homesteading. World War II veterans will be given preference for the Washington, Idaho and Wyoming homesteads.

The new hydroelectric power capacity will become available on the Central Valley project in California (150,000 kw), Columbia Basin Project in Washington (108,000 kw) and, Shoshone project in Wyoming (5,000 kw).

The amounts for each project include, in some cases, money left over from previous years. "We have established detailed plans to roll construction forward as rapidly as funds will allow, to meet the West's needs for more irrigated acres, more electrical energy and all the many benefits of reclamation construction," Strauss said.

Oregon Projects Listed

The work program, including rehabilitation and improvement of certain early projects, showing the location, the job, the approximate amount to be spent during the fiscal year, and a general summary of the work to be performed includes:

Region 1 (The Columbia River Basin).

Oregon—Owyhee project, \$121,000: Complete construction of canal, lateral systems, and other features.

Oregon—Deschutes project, \$987,000: Complete construction of main canal and Willow Creek siphon; construction of Wickiup Dam, Reservoir and lateral system; to be essentially completed.

Oregon—Ochoco Dam (near Prineville), \$350,000: Surveys, studies and rehabilitation work. Completion by 1950.

Output of Douglas Fir Lumber Sets 6-Month Record

PORTLAND, Ore.—(AP)—Douglas fir lumber production was at a record pace the first six months of 1948 despite a flood-caused five-week closure of many Columbia River Basin mills.

The West Coast Lumbermen's Association reported that the project, \$2,200,000. Continue work on diversion channel between Lost River and the Klamath River and channel work in Poe and Langell Valleys; work to provide increased flood protection for leased lands and new veterans' homesteads.

Oregon-Washington cut was 4,108,429,000 board feet in the six months. It was nearly 40 million feet greater than the cut in the same period a year ago, and more than 180 million feet above the first six months of 1946.

H. V. Simpson, executive vice-president of the Association, said it was likely the cut this year would top last year's record-setting 8,344,000,000 feet. The principal obstacle, he said, would be lack of box cars to move the lumber.

Last year mills shut down at intervals because storage yards were full and could not be cleared swiftly. The freight car shortage may continue this year, he said.
