

Fenton in Hard Training for Bout

Babe Fenton, Sutherland boxer slated to meet Portland's Joey Ortega in the Roseburg Armory next Thursday night, is not merely a fighter with a name built up by admiring Sutherland fans. The Babe knows his boxing business.

The flashy featherweight began his fighting career back in 1938 when he first stepped into the prize ring. Fenton held the Oregon lightweight championship in 1940-41 after taking the title from Johnny Wood. In 1943 he attempted to annex the featherweight crown, too, but lost the fight to Portland's Joey Dolan. He has met many of the outstanding fighters, including Swede Bergstrom and Duane "Buzz" Saw Hoag.

Prior to hitting the comeback trail in the Roseburg arena, the mighty mite lost a decision to Hal Freeze about six months ago in Salem. He realized, however, that he wasn't in condition for the Salem bout and since then has undergone strict training for all his battles.

First step back up the ladder of success was his victory over Billy Dove, Portland, Fenton flattened the upstate youth in 1:54 of the first round with one of the fastest flurry of punches ever seen in the local Armory. May 25, he chased Tony Lacetti all over the ring before scoring a TKO over the California featherweight in the seventh round.

Since then, Fenton has been devoting his time and energy to his family of five and his occupation as a well-driller in Sutherland.

Bigger Crown at Stake
By virtue of his past performance in Roseburg, Fenton earned the right to meet Ortega, Oregon's outstanding lightweight. The fight has been contemplated for many months but arrangements were made only recently for the bout. First scheduled for July 20, the card was postponed when the promoters encountered difficulties, including a plea from both Fenton and Ortega, that they be given more time for training.

Angelo-Szasz Mat Battle Promises Thrills for Fans

A one-fall, 20-minute preliminary skirmish on Saturday night's three-star professional wrestling program at the Roseburg Armory may provide local mat followers with more action, color and entertainment than the headline Australian tag-team battle. The bout in question will match Al Szasz, the talented young Hungarian who recently won the coast junior heavyweight championship, and Bruno Angelo, the Italian villain who is the No. 1 claimant of the vacated world's junior heavyweight championship.

Angelo, who was forced to shed nearly 10 pounds in making the light-heavyweight limit against Gordon Hessel her last week, is now campaigning for Szasz's coveted crown and he figures an impressive showing in the tag-team prelim will carry considerable persuasive authority. Handicapped by "baking out" for the Hessel engagement, Angelo said he will be at full strength against Szasz and will not weaken in the late stages of the match, as he

did against Hessel. "I could have beaten Hessel," Angelo said, "but I was so tired toward the end I didn't have the strength."

Another one-fall opener will match Tex Hager, popular Oregonian, against Glen Knox, the head-shaven villain from Tennessee. Hager also has title hopes and is now in strict training to lose four or five pounds before issuing a title challenge to Hessel. Hager looked good in beating Danno MacDonald last week while Knox was disposing of the newcomer from Mexico, Salvador Flores.

Following the two promising prelims, Hager and Szasz will team against Knox and Angelo in the hectic four-man tag-team clash.

Although Knox and Angelo will hold the advantage of power and brute strength, Hager and Szasz figure their speed and agility will more than match the villainous tactics of their opponents. Rules of the Australian tag-team grappling permits sustained action from the opening gong until the finish and the two scientific matmen plan to take full advantage of the substitution rule.

The Hager-Knox match opens the card at 8:30 p.m. Elton Owen will referee all three matches.

DiMaggio's 4-Run Homer Off Feller Defeats Cleveland

Joe DiMaggio's grand slam homer gave the New York Yankees a 6-5 edge over the Cleveland Indians last night, sending Bobby Feller down with his 12th loss of the season.

The Philadelphia A's took advantage of Cleveland's misfortune to advance to within a half game of the lead by noosing out St. Louis in 12 innings, 8-7. Majeski's single with the bases loaded 1 and two out turned the trick against Widmar. Brissie hurried hitless ball for 5 2/3 innings to earn credit for his 10th victory.

The big noise of the American League again was provided by the onrushing Boston Red Sox who won another doubleheader, stretching their string to eight straight.

Stephens hammered homers in each game to humble the Chicago White Sox. Galehouse shut out Chicago with five hits, 3-0, in the first game. Kinder gave the Sox eight hits in taking the second, 5-3, with Stephens knocking in three runs. The double win boosted the Red Sox past the Yankees into third place, only two games out of the lead.

Detroit fell below .500 again, bowing to Washington, 9-8, in 12 innings after scoring six runs in the first game. The Sox's National League lead was boosted to 6 1/2 games when the Braves were rained out at Cincinnati and Brooklyn lost to Chicago.

St. Louis and New York split a pair that didn't help either club. Sheldon Jones outpitched Dickson for a Giant 6-3 edge in the opener but the Cards came from behind to take the finale in 11 innings, 7-6.

Pittsburgh trimmed the Phillies, 5-3 in the opener but wound up in a 1-1 tie in a second game that was stopped by rain after five innings. Kliner's 27th homer was the only Pirate run in the tie game.

Sauer's smash gave Lynn his 14th win — tops for the Coast league—against four setbacks. Sacramento's ace, Cecil, going for his 13th win, wound up instead with his 10th defeat.

Lynn's six-hitter gave the Angels the rubber game of the three-game series.

San Francisco completed its mop-up of San Diego on Melton's five-hit job.

The Seals, however, failed to gain on leading Oakland. The big Oak bats boomed again for 15 hits in a 10-5 triumph over Seattle. The Oaks swept the three-game set.
