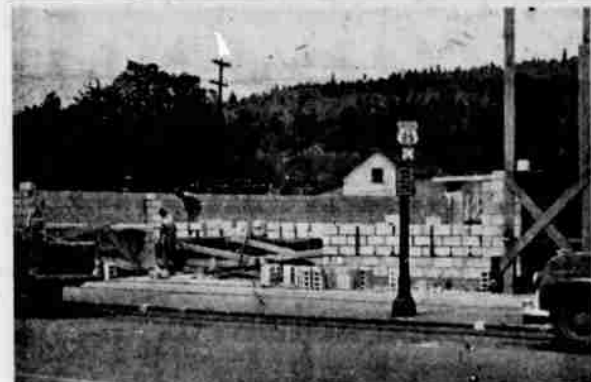

Accepts Employment—Miss Pauline Miller, daughter of Mrs. L. F. Miller, has accepted employment at Craig's.

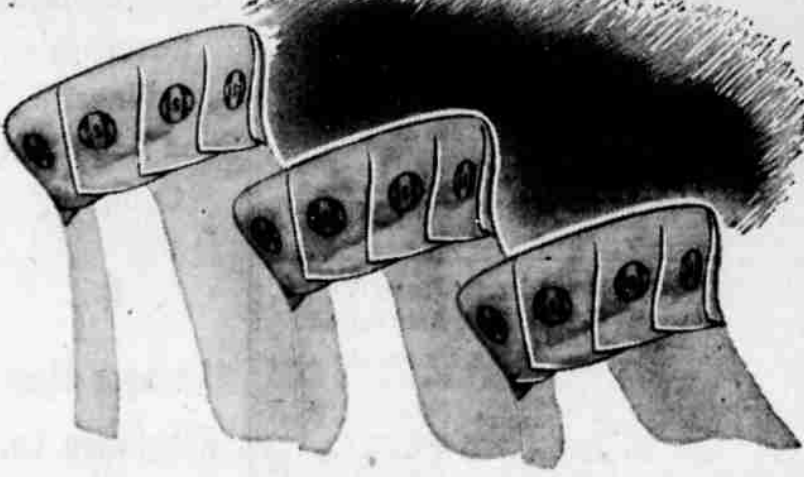
