

League-Leading Oakland Drops Two Games to Portland

Just when Casey Stengel thought he had his Oakland A's rolling in high gear—whack! Up rose the lowly Portland Beavers to hand the Pacific Coast League leaders a double defeat.

Treating the Oaks like just another ball club, the Beavers set them down last night, 5-4 and 7-5. The twin set back pared the front-runners' margin over San Francisco to 11 games. Los Angeles, showing renewed signs of life, is only two games off the pace.

A four-run rally in the sixth inning of the opener and a five-run uprising in the eighth frame of the nightcap ruined the Oakland Club. Lavagetto and Christopher poled homers for the Oaks in the second game and Storey followed suit for the Beavers.

Lajeskie, batting as a pinch hitter in the eighth, singled home the winning run as San Francisco edged Sacramento, 3 to 2. It was the fifth in a row for the surging Seals and the ninth win against six losses for Dempsey, who, although he gave only four hits, just barely managed to

Forest Trails In Diamond Lake Area Slated for Study

Forest trails near Diamond Lake will be studied next week by Henry Shank, trail expert of the U. S. Forest Service at Washington, D. C. He will be accompanied on a five-day horseback trip by M. M. Nelson, supervisor of the Umpqua National Forest; H. F. Erickson, engineer, Forest Service regional office, Portland, and David Judkins, engineer, Umpqua Forest, District Ranger Joe Elliott will guide the party.

Shank will study the trails from the standpoint of location, construction, and areas served. The party will travel by horseback out of Big Camas Ranger Station, headquarters of the district. Their trip will extend from the upper reaches of the North Umpqua River on the north to Black Butte on the south.

Nelson is also on an extended trip through the forest this week with a party from the Northwest Experiment Station at Portland, inspecting timber with a view toward bettering the methods of utilization and silviculture. The party includes Phil Briggleb, Leo Isaac, and Ed Kotok, all of Portland.
