standard of living in relation to the rising population, depends upon its ability to harness the sources of energy to its machines. He named the basic sources of energy as oil, coal, falling water and gas.

The capitalistic system is based upon the productivity of its machines. The problem of maintaining energy is one "vital concern" to the nation, he said.

In the Northwest, there is no oil, coal or gas, he said. "We do have the greatest supply of uncontrolled energy in the 5,000 miles of falling water in the Columbia River system. The nation should continue an orderly program for harnessing that source of energy," he added.

Initiated by Bunyans' Dr. Raver, James Whipple and Harold Woolley, co-chairmen of the dedication program, were initiated into the Roseburg Paul Bunyans as a highlight of the afternoon program. Dr. Raver was charged with "complete and dismal failure" to secure permission of the Umpqua Valley Clan of

Paul Bunyan to enter Douglas County. He was given the title of "Tender of Babe's Water Trough."

Whipple and Woolley, as leading citizens of the community, were charged with failure to greet the Roseburg Paul Bunyans with a brass band and police escort at the Drain city limits. Whipple was named "Keeper of the Sun Tan Lotion" and Woolley as "Keeper of the Water Wings." All the initiates were given a bite of snuff washed down with "blue ox milk."

A memorial plaque was unveiled by Dr. Hunter. The flag covering the plaque was presented to an honor guard of Boy Scouts, who carried the plaque to its position at the base of the flag pole near the swimming pool.

Dr. Hunter said that American democracy is "Drain multiplied hundreds of thousands of times." By means of the living war memorial, the citizens are building into the community "character and leadership for democracy." He added that a good community is known by its character-building agencies, good schools, and well-supported churches.

The day's program was closed with an exhibition of diving and swimming presented by Jack Cody, coach at the Multnomah Athletic Club of Portland, and Ray Staub, Northwest intercollegiate three-meter board champion.

Other highlights of yesterday's program included an open-air union church service conducted by the Methodist Church and the Church of Christ at the memorial grounds. A concert by the Roseburg Elks Band preceded the dedication service.

Boy Scouts from Roseburg, including Larry Henniger, Glen Scofield, and Ed Nolte and their leader, Bill Scofield, presented a life-saving demonstration in the pool.

Drain Boy Scouts conducted a flag-raising ceremony at the flag pole immediately prior to the dedication.

Allies Counter Soviet With Ban on Trains

lin blockade. But Russia has rejected the idea of separation negotiations on Berlin.

U. S. and British officials in Frankfurt orally termed the rail stoppage "economic sanctions." Authorities said the rail commerce between the Soviet zone of Germany and Western Europe "doesn't amount to much."

A Berlin informant insisted that "technical difficulties are real and do exist" as far as the rail traffic into and from the Soviet zone is concerned.

The American-British action means that trains carrying goods from the Russian zone to Switzerland, or to Bremen for shipment to Scandinavia no longer can travel through Western Germany. The same ban applies to traffic from Western Europe if its destination is in the Russian zone.

International mail trains will

be permitted to pass, however. An American military government official said the action may have "far reaching economic and political ramifications."

The exact tonnage affected by the rail block is not known. The order will cut off the shipment of 20,000 tons a month of pyrite, a steel ingredient, from Italy to the Russian zone. It will halt the

supply of brown coal from Eastern Germany to Switzerland.
