First Aid Course Plan of Red Cross

Douglas County Chapter American Red Cross, is organizing a course in first aid which will start during the first week in August and continue for a period of six to nine weeks, depending on how quickly the students wish to complete the course, announced R. M. Stephens, executive secretary.

The course will consist of 18 hours, lectures and demonstration in such fields as:

Control of bleeding, artificial respiration, handling and transportation, prevention of infection, relief of pain and accident prevention.

It is hoped, said Stephens, that this will be the first of a continuous series of courses which will eventually result in development of qualified personnel for the maintenance and operation of first aid stations throughout the county.

Bering Sea Offers Fortunes in Fish, Crabs

ASTORIA, Ore., July 27.—(AP)—The Bering Sea's riches are waiting for the American fisherman.

That's what the experimental ship, Pacific Explorer, reported here after a four-month trial cruise into the northern waters.

The \$4,000,000 ship brought home more than \$1,000,000 worth of canned King crab and fish.

"It is a natural outlet for drag fishermen, who have found slim pickings elsewhere," Capt. Robert Berg said.

He said the giant crabs were caught in such numbers that at times the cannery ship could not handle them all. He cited one day in which eight boats brought in 25,000 crabs in addition to Cod and other fish caught in dragnets.

Russian Church Head Wants Change in Songs

MOSCOW, July 27.—(AP)—The head of the Russian Orthodox church said yesterday that church music is out of tune with its spiritual surroundings.

Patriarch Alexei, in his official newspaper, said decrees should be passed to regulate church singing. The decrees should list religious compositions which can be sung and should establish a religious censor to see that no other songs are sung in cathedrals, he said.

Alexei complained that ancient church melodies are almost forgotten.
