Tisdale, a former resident of Sutherlin and Roseburg, who died July 13 at Lake Tahoe, Calif. Services were conducted by the Rev. Mr. Kempton of Trinity church, Portland, and the Rev. John Richardson of Grace Memorial church, Portland, formerly of Gethsemane Cathedral, Fargo, N. D.

With Mrs. Tisdale at the time of her death were her son, Vice-Admiral Mahlon S. Tisdale, U. S. N., retired, and his wife; her granddaughter, and the latter's husband, Commander and Mrs. Kenneth J. Sarger, and their son, Kenneth Tisdale Sarger.

Mrs. Tisdale was born in Wenona, Ill., March 2, 1866, the youngest of 11 children and was married to Mark N. Tisdale, June 13, 1885 at Lacon, Ill. They lived at Wenona several years, moving to Sutherlin, Minn., in 1896 and to Sutherlin, Oregon, in 1913. Mrs. Tisdale died in Roseburg in 1936.

Mrs. Tisdale continued residence in Roseburg for several years, but more recently had made her home with her daughter in Fargo, N. D.

Surviving are a daughter, Mrs. W. H. (Mary Valli) Long, Fargo; and two sons, Mahlon Tisdale, Vallejo, Calif., and Washington, D. C., and Charles Henry Tisdale, Portland. She leaves six grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

Farmers Urged to Store Portion of Grain Crops

WASHINGTON, July 27.—(AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Brannan yesterday asked farmers to store on their farms a "substantial portion" of the huge grain crops they are producing this year.

Brannan said this would help: 1. Maintain prices of grain; 2. Relieve the jam at terminal markets; 3. Provide more orderly movement of grain.

The department has forecast a record corn crop and the second largest wheat crop in history. The secretary said this year's grain crops are the most expensive ever produced due to the high cost of materials. Farm shortage, he said, would aid in protecting this investment.

Silage Crops Damaged By Cutworms' Invasion

KELSO, Wash., July 27.—(AP)—An infestation of cutworms was

causing heavy damage today to emergency silage crops of the Woodland bottom district. On some fields control measures are under way to stop the threat which developed suddenly during the weekend.

The crops are among the few which could be grown to provide feed vitally needed for fall and winter in this recently flooded area, Ralph Roffler, Cowitt County extension agent, said.

Roffler reported that a crop dusting plane from Scappoose, Ore., began sweeping several of the larger cereal feed crop fields of the Woodland district with a DDT dust application.

August 19 is the deadline for negative arguments.
