

Bandon Baseball Team Victor Over Umpqua Chiefs, 6-1

The Roseburg Umpqua Chiefs lost their first baseball game on the new diamond last night when the visiting Bandon team pounded out eleven hits off two Roseburg hurlers to take a 6-1 decision.

Starting Pitcher Jim Hess held the opposition scoreless the first two innings while his teammates jumped on Ray Blum, Bandon hurler, for two hits and one run in the first inning.

But in the top of the third, Bandon went on a hitting spree. Three singles and a home run by Frank Jarvis, Bandon catcher, tallied four runs to put the visitors in a lead which they never relinquished.

Roseburg came back strong in their half of the third to fill the bases on two singles and a walk, but a strikeout, sacrifice bunt, and a fly to right field left the runners stranded.

Bandon scored again in the fourth and fifth innings to widen their lead to five runs. Two singles in each frame provided the scoring punch.

The Chiefs pulled a switch in the lineup in the seventh inning to hold the visitors scoreless in the last four innings. But Roseburg couldn't get another hit until the final inning and not a run crossed the plate for the local team after that first inning score.

The Chiefs threw a scare into the visitors in the last of the ninth. A single and an error put runners on first and second with one away. But the Bandon hurler hore down on the last two batters and chalked up his last two strikeouts to end the ball game.

Nazlerod Faces Saunders With Fine Ring Record

Bob "Kid" Nazlerod will enter the ring tomorrow night against Tex Saunders, Portland, boasting a record that few fighters can claim. In his 42 amateur and two professional bouts he has never suffered a knockdown.

Nazlerod claims that he has been training seriously for this, his third Roseburg appearance. He has sparred many a practice round against "K.O." Shout and says he has picked up a few pointers that should help him a great deal in his six-round special event with Saunders.

The Kid began his fighting career in Cumberland, Md., when he was just 14 years old. But by the time Bobby was old enough to put on the gloves in competition, the Nazlerod name had earned quite a reputation among Maryland fight enthusiasts. The two older boys were fighting in and around the city and Bobby was well coached by his brothers.

At present, there are still two fighting Nazlerods—Bobby and his 18-year-old "kid" brother.

Nazlerod fought most of his Maryland fights under the sponsorship of the Cumberland American Legion. This experience stood him in good stead for his Army hitch during the war. While stationed at Fort McClellan, Ala., Bob fought his way to the top in his battalion and held the lightweight title for the 26th Battalion during his stay in camp. In 1945, he was an entry in the Golden Gloves regional contest but lost out in the semifinals, suffering one of his three amateur setbacks.

At present, Nazlerod is a foreman at the Associated Western Lumber Co. of Roseburg. And while the kid isn't training for fights or working, he serves as Scoutmaster for Roseburg Troop 108 of 35 boys. Incidentally, Nazlerod was married last Sunday to Miss Gladys Storey of Roseburg.

Castoff Hurler Leads Braves To Win Over Pirates

Billy Southworth, Boston Braves' manager, continues to have amazing success with cast-offs.

Southworth's latest "find" is Nelson Potter, the veteran right-hander he picked up a month ago as a free agent after the latter was fired by Connie Mack of the Philadelphia Athletics.

Potter, who won his first start against Pittsburgh, got his second last night and again came through with a well-pitched game. This time the American League discard permitted the Pirates only six hits in defeating them 5-1 in Boston. He did not allow a run after Kiner tagged him for his 28th home run in the first inning. He did not issue a single base on balls and struck out four, including Kiner in the ninth inning.

The victory in the opener of a 20-game home stand enabled the Braves to widen their first place margin over the rest of the field to five and a half games.

Boston's other Major League entry, Joe McCarthy's rampaging Red Sox, extended their winning streak to 13 straight games by blanking the Tiger 8-0. Kinder turned in his best performance since his purchase from the St. Louis Browns, holding the Tigers to three hits. Newhouse was the victim.

Boston's triumph together with the Cleveland Indians' 10-5 victory over the Athletics, gave the Red Sox a full-game lead in the tight American League pennant race. Although the Indians trail by a game and a half to Philadelphia's one, they took over second place from the A's through a mathematical oddity. The A's, with four more victories and three more defeats than Cleveland, are two percentage points behind the Tribe.

Dodgers Edge Cardinals
The Brooklyn Dodgers replaced the St. Louis Cardinals in the runner-up spot in the National League by coming from behind with two runs in the ninth to nip the Redbirds, 3-2.
