ROMAN RAMPART FOUND

CANTERBURY, England.—(AP)—A thirty-foot rampart thrown up by the Romans to meet the threat of Saxons has been uncovered in excavations on the southeast side of Canterbury. It is believed to have been constructed about 290 A. D. Several coins have been unearthed, of which thirty have been identified as of the third century. Two are rare types issued by Carausius (290 A. D.) in honor of the Second Legion which supported him when he seized power in Britain about 278 A. D.

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Socialist-Labor Candidate Bobs Up From Obscurity

PITTSBURGH, July 28.—(AP)—With all the fuss over the Republicans, Democrats, Dixiecrats and Wallace Third Party, Edward A. Teichart is just about the forgotten man of politics.

Teichart is running for president, too—on the Socialist Labor ticket.

That is, it's the Socialist Labor Ticket everywhere except in the presidential candidate's home state of Pennsylvania. Here it will appear on the ballot as the Industrial Government Party because the better known Socialist Party of Norman Thomas got the ballot first.

Teichart, who, when he isn't running for president, works as an assistant foreman in a Greensburg, Pa., electric equipment plant, claims his party dates back to 1870.

The 44-year-old candidate also ran for president in 1944 and collected a total of 49,000 votes.

The Socialist Labor Party advocates the elimination of capitalism, collective ownership of all industry and distribution systems, employee election of management, and a national congress composed of industrial representatives rather than political delegates.

Teichart's running mate is Stephen Emery, a New York subway dispatcher who is campaigning with him for vice-president.

At the moment Teichart is on a five months' leave from his job.

Republicans Brand Truman's Message As Sheer Politics

WASHINGTON, July 28.—(AP)—Republican congressional leaders jumped on President's Truman's message yesterday as purely political.

There was talk of adjournment within two weeks of the special session Mr. Truman called on housing and cost-of-living legislation. Rep. Allen (R-Ill.), chairman of the Rules Committee, openly favored that course.

Rep. Hugh D. Scott (Pa.), who was named chairman of the Republican National Committee June 26 with the backing of Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, GOP presidential candidate, commented:

"The president has failed completely to establish the existence of a national emergency which would justify his action in convening an extraordinary session of congress in the middle of a political campaign. His failure to establish the existence of such an

emergency confirms the impression, already well established, that his motive in calling the special session was politics and a particularly cheap brand of politics at that.

Senator Taft (R-Ohio) said: "The president's message is full of inaccuracies and omissions on the subjects of high prices and housing. It would take six months to consider this whole program. This only emphasizes the fact that the session is called solely for political purposes."

House Republican Leader Hallett (R-Ind.): "The president insults the intelligence of the American people."

"There is nothing new in his recommendations on prices. Price control, wage control and rationing—in short, OPA police-state methods, will not work in our peace-time economy."

NEW YORK, July 28.—(AP)—Wall Street and the business com-

munity believes the effect of President Truman's legislative proposals would be bad but they don't expect to see them passed by congress.

Their action today was threefold:

1. We approve many of his objectives, but we denounce the means to those objectives.

2. We would be scared to death if we thought Congress would pass the major points of his program.

3. Many of our businesses would not be touched by the proposals, but the effect on the others would be bad.

There was not unanimous agreement on the impact the Truman program would have on the national economy. Businessmen still voiced the question: "Would inflation be halted?"

The influence of a presidential election on the action of both the president and congress was recognized.
