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Accident Board Files Two Suits For Bond Deposit

The State Industrial Accident Commission has filed two suits in Circuit Court requesting a decree enjoining the defendants from further employing workmen in any hazardous occupations unless they post bond or cash deposit equal to three months contributions to the commission.

One case is against Clifford D. Losey and Clayton D. Losey, doing business as Losey Logging Company. The plaintiff charges the defendant has employed workmen in the hazardous occupation of logging since March 12, 1948, subject to workmen's compensation law, and that the defendant has failed to submit reports and contributions as required by law. The plaintiff alleges it is necessary that the defendant post a bond or deposit equal to three months contribution of \$637.50. The plaintiff charges that it has made demand for such bond or deposit, and that the defendant refused to comply and has continued to employ workmen. The plaintiff further asks that the defendant be enjoined until all reports and contributions to date

have been paid. The second case is against Milo M. Claughton. The commission charges that the defendant has employed workmen in the hazardous occupation of logging since July 2, subject to the workmen's compensation law, and that because of unpaid contributions in the amount of \$1,074.69 on previous operations dating from Oct. 1, 1947, to June 30, 1948, the plaintiff has found it necessary for the defendant post a bond or deposit amounting to \$500 equal to three months contributions.

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
