Navy's Top Award To Civilian to Be Given Dave Hill

The Distinguished Service Certificate, the Navy's highest award given to a civilian, will be presented to Dave Hill, a member of the local naval reserve unit, Tuesday, Aug. 3, in the Roseburg Armory at 8 p. m.

Of only two such awards being given by the secretary of the Navy in the west, Hill will receive one of them. Ranking naval officers from the 13th naval district will be present to make the presentation.

Hill, who retired from the regular Navy with a disability after 17 years service, is being honored because of his work in organizing the Roseburg Naval Reserve Unit, and gathering equipment for its use, to the extent that the Roseburg unit is one of the best organized and equipped in the United States. His work has been done without remuneration.

Tuesday's meeting will be a joint Reserve Officer and Naval Reserve Affair and will be open to the public. Members are asked to bring their families. The Reserve Officers are to come in uniform if possible, but "civies" are permissible.

In addition to the award presentation, a farewell party is planned for Hill. He is leaving soon for Birmingham General Hospital for treatment of recurrence of his former disability.

B-29 Companions Of Lost Plane To Continue Flight

TUCSON, Ariz., July 29.—(AP)—Two B-29's will continue their flight around the world while the search goes on for more victims of the crash of a sister Superfortress off the south coast of Arabia, Davis-Monthan air force base announced today.

The base has announced the names of five crewmen killed, six

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missing and one survivor. The B-29 which fell into the sea about a mile off Aden Tuesday night is believed to have had a crew of 17 or 18 men.

The two remaining B-29's will follow the original route, making their first landing on United States territory at Anchorage, Alaska.

Idleyld Resort Readied To Accommodate Vacationists

Idleyld Park Resort, owned and operated by Mr. and Mrs. Joe E. Sendelbach, will be opened for business Sunday, it was announced today. Mr. and Mrs. Sendelbach, who purchased the Idleyld Park store and cabins three and a half years ago, sold the property on the river side of the North Umpqua road, 23 miles east of Roseburg, a year ago to Mr. and Mrs. Stewart Karlinger, and have since been building resort facilities in the park opposite the Idleyld store.

The new Idleyld lodge, a two-story building, 50 by 60 feet, will have a dining room large enough to accommodate up to 75 persons and will be operated Saturdays and Sundays only, except by reservation. It will be managed by Mr. and Mrs. Albert Lurth, who arrived in Roseburg two weeks ago from Arizona, where they have been engaged in restaurant and resort work for a number of years. Chicken and steak dinners will be featured at the new dining room, it was stated.

The building also includes seven overnight hotel rooms on the lower floor, and eleven additional rooms are being constructed on the second floor. Meals for hotel guests will be served daily in the dining room.

Sendelbach reports completion of a trailer camp with accommodations for 25 trailers. Picnic grounds are being provided, and furnished cabins are planned for the future.

No Immediate Danger Of War, Educator Says

PORTLAND, July 29.—(AP)—There is no immediate danger of war. In fact, we are much closer to a world federation. That is the opinion of Clarence K. Streit, president of Federal Union Inc.

He told a Portland extension summer session assembly that his plan for a federation of free nations has been endorsed by the present administration and John Foster Dulles, Gov. Thomas E. Dewey's advisor.

On the war possibility he said, "The Berlin situation is part of the Kremlin's plan to win a victory without war by federal union of the democracies."

Portlanders to Pay More For Less Rich Milk

PORTLAND, July 29.—(AP)—Portlanders will pay 11 cents

more for less-rich milk next week. Study of the State Department of Agriculture order setting a 20-cent-a-quart price showed that it will be illegal to have more than 3.8 percent butterfat content in standard milk. Previously milk could have up to 4.3 percent.

The lower the butterfat content, the less the amount of cream in the top of the bottle.

Butterfat content of other grades also will be cut. Top grade milk—the price goes up from 23 to 24 cents—will be lowered from 5.9 to 5.2 percent.

The order represented defeat for the store chain which had increased the richness of its milk. The chain lost a battle last year to lower the price of milk.

Truman Program Assailed by GOP Leaders on Radio

WASHINGTON, July 29 (AP)—Republican leaders launched a heavy air attack last night against President Truman's special session program, calling it unnecessary, obviously political and possibly dangerous.

GOP chieftains rushed to radio microphones to slam the President's action in calling Congress back to Washington and to explain why they probably won't do much about his anti-inflation and housing proposals.

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
