

Plywood Defeats Squirts; Pastime Slaughters Y-Bay

Umpqua Plywood pulled the biggest upset of this softball season last night when they took an early lead over Schermer's Squirts and went on to post a 6-3 win over the high-flying Squirts. Sutherland Pastime tallied in three of their six innings at bat to roll up a 9-3 victory over the Youngs Bay nine in the second game of the evening.

The lowly Plywood team completely outclassed the Squirts in taking their win—their second victory in nine games. Squirts Pitcher Swede Vang gave up only four hits but four errors by his teammates proved to be the Squirts' undoing.

Umpqua Plywood looked vastly different from the team which finished in sixth place in the first half of the season and lost its first two games in the last half. They started things off in the top of the initial inning by scoring one run on two hits—more safe blows in one inning than either the Vets or Wards could get off Vang in two full games. Then in the top of the fifth, after three scoreless innings, the Plywood boys filled the bases on two Squirts errors and a walk. A fielder's choice in handling Foy's grounder scored Benson from third. A walk with the bases still loaded scored the next run and another error accounted for two more scores to give the Plywood team a five-run lead.

The Squirts' scoring was confined to the sixth inning. A single and the only Plywood error put two men on bases. Then Phil Laurence tallied three runs on a homer through the hole in left-center field.

Umpqua Plywood tallied again in their half of the final inning to bring their total to 9-3 and retired the sides to post their upset win.

Errors Aid Pastimers
In the evening's finale, the Sutherland Pastimers chased across five runs on four hits and four Youngs Bay errors in the last of the second inning. Two of those runs scored on one of the strangest doubles seen in softball play this season. The Youngs Bay infield was expecting a bunt with the bases loaded and one away. At that moment, Jones changed his mind and bunted extra hard to poke the ball over the second basemen's head and slide safely into second. In all, three doubles were racked up by Sutherland in that inning. Allen, Dage and Jones all connected for two-base hits.

Three more Sutherland runs scored in the last of the third on four singles and two Youngs Bay bobbles. Chuck Scofield tallied the first Youngs Bay run in the top of the fourth after reaching first on a walk, advancing to second on a sacrifice bunt, and scoring on Forbes' single.

The final Pastime run crossed the plate in the last of the fifth when Redding bunted safely and reached home by way of two Youngs Bay errors. Sutherland had a bad inning afield in the top of the sixth when the infield and outfield fell apart and committed four errors to allow two Youngs Bay runners to score.

Several Sutherland batters fattened their batting averages at the expense of the Youngs Bay pitchers. Forbes and Shattuck, Redding had a perfect day at bat, hitting two for two and scoring three runs. Roundtree collected a double and two singles in four trips to the plate. Jones and Allen both hit two for three with a double and a single apiece.

The hitting was pretty well scattered in the first game, too. Williams' single and Artberg's double gave each batter a one-for-three average against Vang. All five hits off Whitey Reitmann were collected by separate batters. B. Schermer, L. Baker, F. Schermer, and M. Baker's singles accounted for four of the hits and Laurence's home run was the other hit.

Fighters Set For Gong On Tonight's Bill

Fenton-Ortega Battle Holds Chance for Crack At Northwest Crown

Portland Boxing Manager Wiley Spivey arrived in town today with six of the fighters billed for tonight's boxing card at the Roseburg Armory. Gordon McKay arrived in Roseburg from Klamath Falls last night. Bobby Nazelrod, Babe Fenton and Dick Nyberg met with the out-of-towners this afternoon for the physical examinations and weighing in conducted by the Roseburg Boxing Board physician.

In top shape for tonight's main event, Sutherland's Babe Fenton took it easy yesterday afternoon after a two-week concentrated training period. Fenton said he was in perfect condition to meet the Northwest lightweight champion, Joey Ortega, in tonight's ten-round top billing.

Ortega arrived full of confidence following a recent ten-round draw in Spokane with Will Desjardins, the Canadian bantamweight champ. The Portland fighter is confident but is expecting no push-over against Fenton. He realizes the Sutherland slugger is going to put up the fight of his life tonight in an effort to get a crack at the Northwest featherweight crown currently held by Bobby Richards, also of Portland. Ortega, who makes the weight in the bantam, feather and lightweight classes, will be in no mood for an upset. He, too, is gunning for Richards' title and his chances depend on the outcome of tonight's brawl with Fenton.

Holmes, Lacetti Return
In announcing the full card, Promoters Olsen and Schlotthauer said they were bringing two boys to round out the fight festivities who are no strangers to local fight fans. Chris Holmes, the Salem boy, fought here twice previously, gaining a draw with Nazelrod in his first appearance and losing by a knockout to the Roseburg slugger in the second meeting. Tony Lacetti, his opponent for tonight, suffered a seventh round TKO at the hands of Fenton when the two boys met here May 25. Lacetti has advanced into the welterweight ranks since his defeat here and claims to be in better condition and have more hitting power since his added weight.

Giants and Dodgers Win More Games With New Bosses

The Burt Shotton-Leo Durocher managerial shakeup is proving a tonic to both the Brooklyn Dodgers and New York Giants.

Since kindly old Burt replaced Leo at Ebbets Field, the Dodgers have swept 11 of 15 starts. Under the fiery Durocher, the Giants have won nine of 14 games.

Brooklyn's surge toward the top of the National League has been the most exciting news in the circuit. Even before the change, the Dodgers were rolling. Now the count is 20 won and six lost since that dark evening July 2 when they were stretched on the cellar floor.

What's more, the customers are coming back. Some 12,000 were turned away when Durocher returned with the Giants Monday night before a sellout crowd of 33,392. The next afternoon the Louis Cardinals drew 21,918 through the Ebbets Field gates and yesterday they brought in 19,481. That's the best week day business of the year in Brooklyn, where attendance has been behind the 1947 level.

The Brooks made friends and influenced people in Flatbush by thumping the Cards yesterday, 12-4, dropping St. Louis into a third place tie with the hustling Giants. Brooklyn remains 5 1/2 games behind first place Boston.

The Giants, who are supposed to have no pitching, got their second straight shutout against Cincinnati as Hartung blanked the hapless Reds with three hits. 5-0. Jansen applied the whitewash the night before.

Bickford, now the league's top pitcher on a won and lost percentage basis, weathered two shaky innings to hurl the Boston Braves to an 8-2 victory over Pittsburgh. For Bickford it was win No. 7 against two defeats.

The Braves climbed loser Riddle for most of their runs before he was batted out in the seventh. Eddie Sawyer's Phillies won their first game for their new manager, 9-4, over the Chicago Cubs who spoiled Sawyer's debut Tuesday.
