Check Given To Dodge Nazis Held Up, Suit Declares

NEW YORK, July 29 (AP)—A suit on file in Federal Court today charged that Frank Jay Gould, millionaire son of the late railroad magnate, had stopped payment on a \$400,000 check he gave a French woman for hiding him from the Nazis.

The suit, filed yesterday by Mme. Anne Vilbert de Sairigne, member of a prominent French family, who assisted the French underground during the war,

asked for a judgment to enforce payment of the check.

Mme. De Sairigne said she sheltered the 70-year-old Gould for about eight months at her villa at Juan-Les-Pins on the French Riviera. She claimed he feared arrest, internment or deportation by the occupying Germans.

Gould, who has retained his American citizenship, has lived in France since 1910. He was said to have inherited more than \$10,000,000 of his father's \$83,000,000 estate.

Gould is believed to be in France. The papers in the suit said Mme. De Sairigne was a resident of New York.

Dr. James Macnab Ends Session At Marine Station

Dr. James A. Macnab of Longview, Wash., is visiting his mother in Roseburg for a few days. Dr. Macnab has just concluded a six weeks' session at Charleston U. S. Marine Station on Coos Bay.

Truman Says He'd Sign Oleo Tax Repeal Bill

WASHINGTON, July 30 (AP)—President Truman said yesterday that if Congress passed legislation repealing oleomargarine taxes he will sign it.

He made that statement when a reporter asked at his news conference why he had not asked repeal of the taxes in his message to congress. The Democratic platform declares for repeal.

During the regular congressional session, the house passed an oleo tax repeal bill but the Senate never acted. The tax is one-

fourth cent a pound on uncolored oleo and 10 cents a pound on colored. There are also license taxes on oleo manufacturers and dealers.
