Portland Businessmen Flying to Arctic Circle

PORTLAND, July 30.—(AP)—Forty flying businessmen left here today on a 7,000-mile flight to the Arctic Circle and back—an even longer route than their flight to Mexico five months ago.

The group, which files both for fun and for business, left in 15 private planes. Three more planes will leave over the weekend and catch up with the group at Whitehorse and Fairbanks.

Led by L. S. White, the businessmen-pilots expect to reach Calgary this afternoon. They will fly on to Fort Nelson Saturday.
