World's Amateur Softball Series Dated in Portland

For the first time in history, the world's amateur softball championship games will be held west of Ohio when the 16 top men's and women's teams gather in Portland September 12 to open the two week's play.

The women will decide their championship first, launching action September 12 and playing nightly to Sept. 18. The 16 regional men's title clubs will inaugurate their tourney Sunday, Sept. 19, and continue through the following Sunday.

The tournament committee has arranged for the various teams to visit cities out of Portland in the hope that some of the regional champions will be scheduled for games other than tournament affairs. Team sponsors or civic groups in Oregon towns should make note of this. A game between a local all-star club and one of these tournament teams would be a natural. But the competition will be rough—any one of the visiting teams will represent the best his softball region has to offer.
