river between Kentucky and the Mountain State is getting a new sheriff.

The Rev. Homer Ashbury Pelfrey—"Homer"—to everyone—a square-set man, 36 years old and a minister since 1938, is resigning his pulpit to run for sheriff. Besides being a Baptist he is also a Democrat—an unbeatable combination in Wayne county.

Not since 1896—32 years ago—has Wayne county elected a Republican sheriff, and there's nothing in the wind to indicate that there will be a change this year.

His nomination is tantamount to election. Politics is not new to Mr. Pelfrey. He served as a clerk for the Interstate Commerce Commission in Washington, and for the past four years as a deputy state tax collector. The tax job was carried along with his work in the church. But he'll devote full time to the job of sheriff.

"I'm not going to be in rip-roaring reforming sheriff," says Mr. Pelfrey. "I have no special ideas about reform. In fact, Wayne county is in good shape and a fine place to live."

But let any lawless elements be forewarned. His hobby is hunting, and he's a crack shot.

Refugee Aid Commission Appointed by Truman

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3.—(AP)

President Truman yesterday named a three-man displaced persons commission to start the flow of 202,000 European refugees into the United States during the next two years.

The three appointees, Ugo Carusi, Edward M. O'Connor and Harry N. Rosenfield, will supervise immigration under the law enacted in June. Mr. Truman sent their names to the Senate for confirmation.

Carusi, former commissioner of immigration in the Justice Department, for the past eleven months has been on special

assignment with the State Department, working on the problem of displaced persons.

He recently completed a three-month tour of refugee camps in Europe.
