

Checking Home Conditions Big Factor in Safety

Most accidents do not just happen—they are caused!

This is especially true of accidents in the home, says Miss Mary Beth Minden, O. S. C. extension home management specialist, who points out that home accidents are on the increase. Carelessness, hurry, fatigue, improper light and poor housekeeping habits are the chief causes of home accidents.

Miss Minden states that planning and conscious effort are necessary to remove accident hazards. Carelessness, for example, is a matter of not thinking—not seeing what might happen.

Another accident cause, hurry, is the trend of the times, but a minute spent at a slower pace today, may save hours later. Speed seems to bring all of the hazards to the front and ac-

idents are the result.

Fatigue is another source of accident in the home. Miss Minden points out that tired persons have dulled senses, so that otherwise careful persons seem not to have the energy to carry out the safety practices which they know are right.

Poor light is another important cause of home accidents. The National Safety Council reports that falls often resulting from poor light are the most important of farm work injuries. Improperly stored tools, toys and household supplies are familiar causes for this type of mishap. The home management specialist says small rugs that are spotted at the top and bottom of stairs are particularly important. Remove them, she suggests, or at least anchor them securely.

Other types of home accidents are caused by stairs that are not equipped with handrails, by frayed electrical cords, rickety stairladders and incorrect electrical fuses to name only a few.

Italy Ready For European Union, Sforza Announces

ROME, Aug. 4.—(AP)—Italy is ready to take the lead in surrendering national sovereignty to bring about European union, Foreign Minister Count Sforza said today.

The 74-year-old statesman urged union now as the only cure for the continent's postwar economic and political ills and the sole hope for peace.

To bring it about and to do away with "archaic frontiers and archaic customs duties," he declared in an interview, this nation is ready to "accept curtailment of its political sovereignty, even in the most unexpected aspects."

He said there was but one condition: "That others do the same."

The question of national sovereignty has been and is one of the primary stumbling blocks in

the way of a united Europe. "To say that European countries ought to federate," the Italian foreign minister said, "is to say that they must restrain in their economic life useless competition and divergent efforts."

BULB THEFT PAYS

BERLIN.—(AP)—This is probably the only city in the world where one man could make more than \$500 a week stealing electric light bulbs. The bulb thief may not be "public enemy No. 1" in Berlin but he ranks pretty near the head of the list. He steals bulbs from subway trains, subway stations, apartment house lobbies, telephone booths and any other vulnerable place. One such thief confessed that his sole occupation for two years was stealing light bulbs. He sold the bulbs in the black market. He got fourteen months imprisonment.

Fruit Icebox Pie

Broadcast: August 7, 1948

9-oz. can crushed pineapple 1 tablespoon lemon juice
1 package straw-berries 1/2 cup Fat Milk
1/2 cup gelatin 1 cup Graham cracker crumbs
1 1/2 cups powdered sugar 1/4 cup soft butter or margarine
1/2 teaspoon salt 2 eggs, separated

Drain pineapple, saving juice. Add enough water to juice to make 1/4 cup. Heat to boiling. Stir in gelatin until dissolved. Add pineapple, 1/4 cup powdered sugar, the salt and lemon juice. Chill until thoroughly cold; then stir in milk. Chill until syrupy. Meanwhile, grease a deep 9-in. pie pan. With back of spoon, press 1/4 cup crumbs on bottom and sides of pan. Put butter into bowl; work remaining 1 cup of powdered sugar into butter. Beat in egg yolks. Spread carefully over crumbs in pan. Chill. Fold stiffly beaten egg whites into syrupy gelatin mixture. Pour into prepared pan. Sprinkle remaining 1/4 cup crumbs over top. Chill until firm.
