It all started back in 1925 when a skinny youngster named Walt Disney used to tramp around Hollywood with a hungry look, a baggy sweater on his bony frame, and a film can under his arm. He was trying to get somebody to buy his animated cartoons, but everybody told him

that animated cartoons were deadlier than dodos. Then Hollywoodians began to hear of a little black and white picture that had sneaked in on the bill at the Colony Theater in New York. Something made by a young fellow named Disney and starring, of all things, a mouse named Mickey. The audience, it seems, was laughing its collective self silly over the thing. In 1933, when Disney thought

it would be fun to do The Three Little Pigs, in color by Technicolor, some of his own co-workers told him that it would be silly to try to make anything out of that old-fashioned little nursery rhyme.

Then while The Three Little Pigs was helping to pull the nation out of the depression, Walt was quietly wondering why not try a full-length job on his production in color by Technicolor. Work began on Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs.

Word leaked out around town. The anvil chorus started its wall again. "Who does he think is gonna sit through an hour and a half of cartoon!"

Snow White opened in December of 1937 in Hollywood, and started off to a brisk business that soon was followed by record-breaking success all over the world. One big feature film on the same scale has emanated from the Disney studio.

Currently, one of his hits, Bambi, is being re-released. It is the life story of a deer, full of humor, high adventure and spectacular surprises. It carries an exclusive animal cast, and also in color by Technicolor; now playing at the Indian.

## Roland Schwartz On Security Duty In Trial of Japs

According to an International News Service report from Tokyo dated Aug. 2, 35 men and one woman are virtually imprisoned to begin the gigantic task of translating the verdicts in the Tokyo war crimes trial. The job is expected to take six weeks. Estimate of the time it would take to complete the task was made by Captain Roland Schwartz, only son of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Schwartz of Roseburg. He is the security officer in charge of maintaining the most rigid secrecy. He said that after its completion the translated judgment will be rushed under bristling guard to the courtroom where the International Far East Tribunal reconvenes to pronounce the verdict.

The 36 translators were locked in the ex-home of a Japanese watchmaker Monday. Extremely elaborate precautions were put into effect to make sure not a whisper leaks out of the house about the contents of the bulky final judgment on ex-Premier Hideki Tojo and his 24 co-defendants. Barbed wire completely encircles the building and its grounds. American M. P. guards stand posted at every door and other key points on and about the premises.

Within the barbed wire enclosure a self-sufficient little community has been set up. There are mess halls, a post exchange, movie theater, game room, library, dispensary and laundry.

The translators' corps consists of 12 Americans and 24 Japanese. All have been specially selected for their skill and experience in

rendering English into Japanese and vice versa.

The woman on the staff is Joyce Seidel of Seattle. Her job is to work on a huge cross-index file of Japanese legal terms.

The Dominican Republic occupies the eastern two-thirds of the island of Haiti and the remainder is the home of the republic bearing the island's name.
