Another heavy-hitting University of Oregon athlete is Johnny Kovenz, left fielder. In that same game with the Braves, Kovenz racked up four hits in five trips to the plate and was credited with two stolen bases, the only pilfering of the game. Not only are the Reds a heavy-hitting club but they know how to handle the ball at field, although they have been plagued with errors. In their last game they retired their opponents twice on double plays and two of their players lead the league in that department with eight double plays apiece.

Last night in Eugene, the Reds lost a heartbreaker to the Miller Lumbermen as the Millers scored all six times on unearned runs. On the basis of earned runs, the Reds should have been the 1-0 victors. Both teams gathered eight hits but five errors spelled defeat for the Guistina club.
