his conduct in impeachment proceedings.

The speaker went on in that vein for quite a while. Then, before Mr. Truman's Democratic

supporters could get the floor for a rebuttal, the special session was adjourned.

Dixiecrat Defends Truman

Yesterday, however, a Dixie Democrat who broke with the president earlier this year over his civil rights program took to the air in Mr. Truman's defense.

Senator Hoey of North Carolina told a radio audience Ferguson had delivered himself of a "political tirade" and that actually every president starting with Washington has followed a policy of withholding data on federal employees.

"President Truman is entitled to commendations instead of condemnations" for his effort to rid the government of Communists and their sympathizers, Hoey declared.

He insisted, too, as has Mr. Truman, that the investigations turned up nothing new to either the FBI or the Justice Department.

Requests Ignored

The measures the president got out of the special session represented only a crust of the loaf he asked.

The lawmakers voted a housing bill aimed at encouraging the building of small homes and large rental properties. And a separate appropriation to carry out this program did include \$5,000,000 for automobiles for disabled veterans, as Mr. Truman had asked.

But neither measure contained the subsidies for low-rent and slum clearance housing that the president proposed.

On the anti-inflation front, the Republican-controlled Congress gave him even less.

Its bill consisted of authority to restore wartime curbs on time-price buying and to increase federal reserve bank reserves—thus cutting down on bank loans and indirectly on the amount of money in circulation.

The president asked for both of these, but he also wanted price controls and other measures to combat the cost of living.

The president made housing and anti-inflation the chief objectives of the session. But he asked for a long list of other measures.

Federal aid to schools, a higher minimum wage, broadening of social security, expansion of the public power program and a rise in federal workers' pay.

Dewey Splits Even

Congress passed one bill both Mr. Truman and his Republican opponent, Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York, approved. It authorizes a \$25,000,000 loan to the United Nations to build a permanent home in New York City.

That was all Dewey could claim on the credit side for the first session of a Republican Congress. A GOP presidential nominee has seen in action since the '20s.

Bridge Collapse Held Due To Removal of Braces

where the other braces had been removed.

"Before the bridge had been removed, the braces had a vertical clearance of 13 feet, three inches; this is two feet, three inches above the legal limit for high loads, which in itself proves the parties had no right whatsoever to cut them, which was obviously done to take some high, illegal load through the bridge."

"The bridge was posted for five tons," he said. It had previously been posted for eight tons before the braces were cut. "A load of logs with at least 7,000 F. B. M. (foot board measure) is a violation of all county hauling permits, which specify a maximum 4,500 F. B. M. I can find no failure, as yet, in the lower cord."

"For the past two or three weeks," he stated, "I have been measuring all our truss bridges to determine the vertical clearance. As yet, I have found no bridge with less than 13 1/2 feet vertical clearance and some of them are as high as 15 or 16 feet. Therefore, I consider it a criminal offense for any logging concern to start to remove any of these portal braces without first securing written permission from the County Court, with the understanding they be replaced immediately. As yet, I have never found a single logging operator who has done this."

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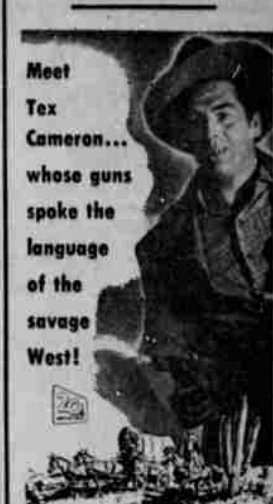
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
