Russia About to Add Romania To Her List of Satellite Nations

Romanian refugees in Turkey report that a plebiscite is to be held in their country late this month to determine whether it shall become a member of the Soviet Union.

Should this prove to be true it will mean that Russia is starting the annexation—long expected by observers—of her eastern European satellites. Such an expansion of the Soviet empire would further consolidate her grip on that half of the continent and pave the way for fresh efforts at further moves towards the English channel.

Should Romania vote to "join" the Soviet Union, the refugees say, the Romanian parliament will be dissolved and delegates to Moscow will be named instead. Then, of course, Moscow could send Russian troops into Romania without question either from her people or from foreign countries. As a matter of fact, it is said four Russian divisions already have surrounded Bucharest and have strengthened the garrisons in other cities. What price a free plebiscite?

This column previously has forecast that Moscow in due course would annex the satellite states, whose governments already have been ousted in favor of Communist regimes. There is no doubt that Russia would have done so already as in the case of the three little Baltic states, but for the fact that she now is dealing with larger and sturdier nations, and furthermore wishes to maintain a pose of legality so as not to create fear and hostility among prospective victims.

Resistance Spurs Soviet

The indications are that Moscow is getting anxious because of the discontent and resistance which are running through the satellites. It behooves the Soviet to move fast if she is to maintain that Stettin-Adriatic line which she has forged through the heart of Europe by her conquest of the countries now behind the iron curtain.

If you will take a look at your map of Eastern Europe you will see the strategic importance of annexing Romania with her population of close to 16,000,000. She is bounded on the north by the U. S. S. R., on the east by the Soviet Ukraine and the Black Sea, on the west by Yugoslavia and Hungary and on the south by Bulgaria. With Romania in the fold, Russia will to all intents and purposes have moved her

frontiers up against the three important neighboring satellites. They come next for annexation. It's the old game of pyramiding.

Policies Revived By 60 Veterans In Roseburg Area

During the final week of reinstating GI insurance without a physical examination, approximately 60 veterans of this area revived their term policies through the Roseburg office of the Veterans Administration.

This estimate, Clifford Fields, VA representative said today, does not include others who applied directly by mail to the Northwest insurance center at Seattle.

Contrary to an impression which grew out of the "easy reinstatement" headline of July 31, ex-GIs may still regain their



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service insurance, Mr. Fields pointed out.

A "physical" will be required, however, to reinstate all policies except those which have been lapsed for less than three months.

"Half of all recent insurance revivals have involved changes in beneficiaries," the VA aide commented. "Many veterans believe that when they marry or acquire children or are divorced, their insurance beneficiaries change automatically."

"Nothing is further from the truth," Fields emphasized. "A veteran must notify the VA in writing when he wants his beneficiary changed. No change can be made after his death."

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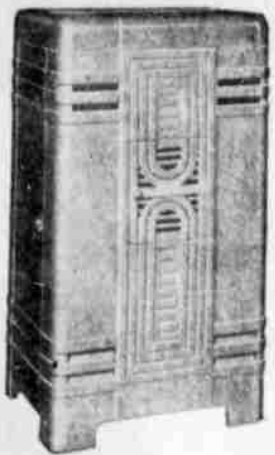


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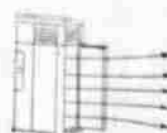
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
