

Jaycees Planning Radio Forum, Team Of Softballers

Wainwright Says He Was Misquoted In Regard To Tojo

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Aug. 10.—(P)—General Jonathan M. Wainwright, hero of Corregidor and Bataan, yesterday acknowledged he had a conversation with George Francis Blewett at the Republican National convention in Philadelphia, but the retired general said "Blewett had misquoted him."

Blewett is defense counsel for wartime Japanese Premier Hideki Tojo in a Tokyo war crimes trial. "I told Blewett I did not think Tojo was a great deal responsible for my personal punishments while I was a prisoner," Wainwright declared in San Antonio. "It was generally understood that local or individual commanders dictated treatment of prisoners in their immediate areas, but Tojo was chief of the military staff and must have approved policies covering treatments given prisoners."

"I hold Tojo responsible for the military policies, and in that way, he is indirectly responsible for my own suffering and the suffering of many others," Wainwright said. "If Tojo had not approved, the brutalities never would have been placed into effect."

Wainwright said he was "partially discrediting" Blewett's statement last week which said Wainwright had absolved Tojo of personal responsibility for maltreatment he had received.

Father Faces Second Child-Facing Charge

PORTLAND, Aug. 10.—(P)—A grand jury formally accused John Archuleta, 26, ex-professional boxer, yesterday of beating his 21-year-old son severely. The boy, scarred and bruised, was found in a locked room at the Archuleta house last month. Archuleta previously was sentenced to 180 days for beating his 21-year-old daughter, twin to the boy.

Investigation Begun Into Woman's Death

MEDFORD, Ore., Aug. 10.—(P)—Police were investigating today the death of Mrs. Ludmila Jones, 40, of Butte Falls. She died Saturday night in unexplained circumstances. Police said the woman's eyes were blackened. The coroner's office is conducting an autopsy.

Military services will be held Sunday, Aug. 15 at 2:30 p. m. in the Masonic Cemetery, conducted under the auspices of the American Legion, with Dr. C. A. Edwards officiating.

Bosworth was born at Dillard Aug. 20, 1920. He attended the Roseburg Schools and enlisted in Company D, 182nd Infantry, Nov. 30, 1943. He was a member of the Methodist Church. Surviving are his mother, Mrs. Myrtle Bosworth Walker; his father, Alva A. Bosworth; his stepfather, John Walker, all of Roseburg; two sisters, Mrs. Hazel Butler and Mrs. Arline Barton; a brother, Alva A. Bosworth Jr., all of Roseburg; two stepbrothers, Frank Walker, Roseburg, and Sergeant Clarence Walker, Medical Corps, Fort Douglas, Utah; two stepisters, Mrs. Bessie Lambert, Dallas, Texas, and Mrs. Helen Niday, Roseburg, and grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Hixson Brockway.
