

Heifers Project to Supply Foreign Children With Milk Told by Director at Kiwanis

In some European districts, no child born in 1945 is still alive, in some sections no child under three years of age still lives, and three-year-olds are no larger than one-year-olds should be. These are the facts quoted by David E. Norcross, director of the "Heifers for Relief" program with headquarters at Pasadena, Calif., at the weekly Kiwanis Club meeting Tuesday noon.

Basing their program upon the knowledge one goat can save the life of three children and one cow, ten children, the organization, with modest headquarters in

a church basement in Pasadena, has shipped over 5000 heifers to Belgium, France, Poland, Czechoslovakia, Greece, Italy and China and an additional 1500 goats to Okinawa and Japan.

"We don't believe in power politics," the speaker said. "We just ask are you hungry? And send them a cow."

The Army is in full accord with the program, and is arranging for the shipment of the animals whenever possible, he said. The heifer project committee sees to the proper collection, tagging,

testing and shipping of the heifers. Sea-going cowboys under the supervision of the Brethren Service Committee go with the heifers to see they have proper care, he said.

Representative of the heifer project committee, in cooperation with representatives of the receiving country, make all necessary arrangements with the family receiving the heifer. Distribution is made without regard to race, color or creed. Delivery to the family in Europe is made in the same spirit as their donors give them, said Norcross.

Each family receiving a heifer agrees to share the surplus milk and give the first calf to a neighbor, who makes the same agreement, and so the herds grow, he said. It costs approximately \$175 to raise, breed and transport a heifer to a port of embarkation.

Project's Origin and Growth

Tracing the history of the Heifer Project, Norcross stated it was a unique relief plan originated by the Church of the Brethren to bring fresh milk to little children. The idea was conceived in 1942 by Dan West, Brethren worker in Spain during the revolution, who saw how bitterly the children were suffering. Upon his return to America, he talked with other workers who were heartily in favor of helping the children. Being farmers, they hit upon the idea of using something with which they were familiar. They decided delivering bred heifers to the needy areas would be an excellent way to bring milk to starving little ones and proposed that a calf for this purpose be "consecrated" by each farm.

Although the plan started with the Brethren, today the Mennonites, Quakers, Catholics and Northern Baptists are represented on the National Heifer Project Committee, and other groups, including schools, service clubs and women's clubs have contributed heifers and money. It is now an inter-faith project, he said.

Emphasizing the need for relief, Norcross stated 40 per cent or nearly 400 million children under the age of 15 years today are hungry. A young service man he talked to, who had returned from Italy, stated that while they were not permitted to feed the hungry children, the men often left more than half their food on their plates then dumped it in the garbage cans, knowing the children would find it there.

Another man reported that upon arrival of a shipment of cows in Italy, children with containers swarmed over the docks hoping to get some of the milk they had never before tasted. This man reported he had not only viewed the cows that had been sent over, but drank their milk, saw their

calves and their calves' calves. Unlike other relief, which goes when consumed, the animals flourished into herds to feed the hungry.

Norcross quoted a Rev. Mr. Nicholson, a Quaker, who accompanied a load of 40 goats to the leper colony off Okinawa. The chaplain, he said, met him with tears in his eyes, saying, "I didn't know any one cared about us." He was told "The people of America care. They love you all."

Norcross is visiting in Roseburg at the present time. He said he lived here many years ago, and that the town would look more familiar to him if it had a couple of the livery stables it

had then and fewer of the modern buildings.

The father of M. M. Nelson, Kiwanis Club president, is a member of Norcross' committee at Pasadena.
