

Oaks Trim Seals To Narrow Gap In League Race

Some folks may have conceded the Coast League pennant to San Francisco. But not Casey Stengel's Oaks.
Oakland, opening a key series with the league-leading Seals, racked up a 3-1 victory last night. That narrowed the gap between the cross-bay rivals to two games.
Gassaway left-handed the Seals into submission, with help on the last two batters from Buxton. Gassaway, winning his 11th against six setbacks, had a four-hit shut-out until Orteig hit a three-run homer in the ninth.
It was Oakland's 13th victory in 22 starts against the Seals.
Portland's Beavers — building up steam for the stretch run — threw righthander Don Johnson, just in from Kansas City, at the San Diego Padres. Johnson responded with a 6-1 victory.

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Inspection Set At Canyonville For New Guard Unit

An inspection of the new National Guard company organized at Canyonville will be conducted Thursday by Colonel Upson of the Inspector General's Department of the 6th Army at the Presidio of San Francisco. It was announced by Lt. Col. Robert L. Irving, battalion commander of the 186th Infantry.
The new company has been designated as Co. B, 186th Infantry. Purpose of the inspection, which will be at 8 o'clock in the Rod and Gun Club building at Canyonville, will be to determine whether federal recognition shall be extended to the new unit.
Col. Irving also announced that 1st Lieutenant Robert J. Lilly of Riddle and Russell C. Sharpe of Canyonville successfully passed examinations for appointment as officers in the Oregon National Guard Tuesday night. Lt. Lilly will command the new unit and Lt. Sharpe will serve as executive officer.

Lt. Col. Edwin Briggs and 1st Sgt. Cheatum, instructors for the 1st Battalion 186th Infantry, are spending this week in Canyonville helping Lt. Lilly and Lt. Sharpe prepare the new unit for the 6th Army inspection, Col. Irving said.

Besides the two officers, 24 men have been signed for the unit and have completed physical examinations. The new unit may enlist 26 men, or two more, prior to activation Thursday night. It is expected that the quota for the unit will be increased later.

Other visitors at the inspection Thursday will include Capt. John H. Nilsson, battalion adjutant, and Capt. Darrell Farris, battalion plans and training officer, both from Medford. A representative of the Adjutant General's office at Salem is also expected.

Thursday's ceremony will include short talks by the visiting officers as well as the formal inspection by Col. Upson. Light refreshments will be served. The public is invited.
