Current Political Trends May Herald Two-Party Reshuffling

For a long time, political philosophers have been expecting the major parties to break up. They had an idea that conservatives of the two parties might realign under the Republican banner, and progressives of the two parties under the Democratic emblem.

When many Republicans were pushed by the depression into the New Deal, some observers thought such realignment had come. They imagined that the New Deal would take over the Democratic Party, and that Southern conservatives would then move over and join up with conservative Republicans in a major opposition.

It didn't work that way for many reasons. One was because the southerners would not dream of becoming Republicans, and the GOP residue, not realizing that its party was forever dead, wouldn't give up its old and honorable name. Another reason was, because, behind a conservative, sometimes reactionary and often ineffective leadership, the GOP had a big majority of genuine liberals who had nothing in common with conservatives of either party. It looks now as though it wasn't a big majority, but an actual majority.

Therefore party organizations and names persisted. The country

stumbled along under a two-sided two-party system until the balance shifted. It shifted so far that this summer the Democrats went into a national convention more utterly hopeless than the GOP was in 1936, or even in 1932.

Now political philosophers once more are talking about a breakdown in the two-party system, perhaps to be followed by realignment into conservative and liberal camps.

The GOP is split down the middle. The progressive element, personified by Dewey and Warren, Vandenberg and Stassen, won the nomination race, but the conservative element, personified by Taft and Martin, Hallock and Wherry, dominates Congress by seniority.

The Democrats are split down the middle so badly that the South has formed its own party, and some states seem willing to help elect Dewey rather than let Truman stay in the White House.

But the Republicans, confident of victory, aren't going to join the States Righters, and the Southerners aren't going to vote Republican. And, even if the Solid South did swing over, the "liberals" aren't in shape to come into the Democratic Party under Truman. They, too, are

split down the middle. Their extreme left is playing the Communist's game in Wallace's Progressive Party, their right probably will vote for Truman only because there isn't any other place to go.

This could be the beginning of a splitup into a lot of minority parties, out of which would come coalition governments headed by presidents elected by Congress.

That seems doubtful, but it is even more doubtful if—anywhere in the present multitude of splinter groups—there is the making of any permanent conservative-versus-liberal party alignment.
