Enrollment Up At S. O. College

ASHLAND, Ore., Aug. 14.—Enrollment at Southern Oregon College reached the 200 mark for the post session. This number is the largest second session enrollment in the history of the college and represents an increase of 30 over the same session of last year according to Mabel Winston, registrar. These students come from six different states, from sixteen counties in Oregon, and vary in age from 18 to 64. There are twice as many women as men. The majority are taking the teacher training curriculum. Receipt of a bequest of \$414.11 from the estate of Thomas Roberts of Portland, to the college student loan fund was acknowledged by Dr. Elmo N. Stevenson, president of the college.

The bequest amount will be added to the present Southern Oregon College loan fund and administered by the regular faculty committee on student loans. The will of the late Mr. Roberts provides that loans may be made in amounts not to exceed \$200 and are payable not later than five years from the date of the loan.

Park Service Bans Plan To Heighten Mt. Rainier

SEATTLE, Aug. 14.—(AP)—The face lifting job which would have made Mt. Rainier the second highest peak in the nation is off. The National Park Service said "no" yesterday to the four Seattle mountain climbers who wanted to do a rough job of plastic surgery on the Northwest's biggest hill. They planned to build a 24-foot cairn of rocks and

snow atop the 14,408-foot mountain. You can see what this would have done to Mt. Elbert in Colorado, which is 14,431 feet up. Mt. Whitney is first at 14,495 feet and ranking third behind is 14,418-foot Mt. Massive in Colorado. The Park Service said it "could not approve such stunts."

Oregon Unit Overseas Aid Program Organized

PORTLAND, Aug. 14.—(AP)—Organization of an Oregon unit of the Christian Rural Overseas Program, which sends food to Europe and Asia, was announced yesterday. Judge H. E. Arestad of Canby was named chairman of the state executive board. CROP is sponsored by Church World Service, Lutheran World Relief, and Catholic Rural Life.
