LONDON, Aug. 16.—Athletes for Communist-dominated eastern Europe who came to Britain for the Olympics are seeking ways to avoid going home.

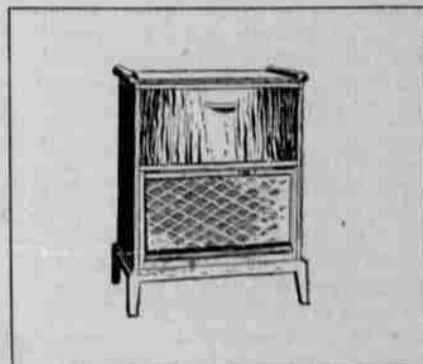
