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Fire, Blast at Reno Kill 5, Injure Scores

officer was using only a figure of speech—"That's dynamite," referring to the fire hazard. Authorities were certain, they said, there were no explosives in the building. Pending further exploration of the ruins, they could not say what caused the blast. The policeman's warning was well-timed.

Damage in Six Figures
A few of the timid retreated," said John Sanford, city editor of the Reno Gazette. "The rest pushed closer. There was a roar. Smoke, shot through with spurts of flame, blanketed a half block of Lake Street."

Property damage was estimated, unofficially, at between \$100,000 and \$300,000.

The blast blew out the front of the building, which housed small shops, a vacant cafe and a small rooming house. A slot machine—one of those under repair in one of the shops—went booming across the street. Shoes were blown off some spectators.

The crowd, showered with smoking debris and splintered glass, broke in panic. Some were trampled underfoot. Others were badly cut. All available ambulances were summoned, some racing to Reno from points as distant as Truckee, Calif., 35 miles west of here.

case and then chosen a moment of great excitement here and abroad over the Kosenkina and Samarine incidents?

Also why should the customs official be designated only with the letter "E" in the public release if the Soviets considered the charges legitimate and were bringing legal action against him?

The Russian government considers any unauthorized dealings between a Soviet citizen and a foreigner to be an offense, and the release of official information in that way is an extremely grave crime in Soviet eyes.

State Department officials tentatively concluded that the Soviet government is recognizing that it badly overplayed its charges of American criminality, kidnapping and violations of international law in the case of the two schoolteachers in New York.

Cooked up 4 Months Ago
These officials believe that probably even in the Soviet Union itself some facts in the case are beginning to leak through.

Dreher is a 32-year-old naval lieutenant presently assigned to the important office of chief of naval operations here. For two years until last May 1 he was assistant naval attache at Moscow.

Press officer McDermott said Dreher was arrested in Moscow April 23, detained for several hours and then released. Whereupon he reported to Ambassador Smith what had happened.

This, according to McDermott, was that "E" had called Dreher on the telephone and asked him to come to "E's" office in the Bureau of Customs. Dreher had known "E" in the Russian port of Odessa. In fact, "E" had been the Soviet official specifically assigned to help him expedite shipments arriving for the American embassy.

Hence, it was said here, Dreher was not surprised to find that "E" was calling him in Moscow, and he readily agreed to visit his office.

Dreher had applied for an exit visa from Russia about April 16. State Department officials believe the Soviets at that time decided to cook up an espionage case against him and put it on ice until some future time when they might need such an incident for publicity or other purposes.

Truman Forecast Of Debt Draws GOP Reply

the \$1,500,000,000 deficit Mr. Truman predicted, there will be a surplus "that will be not less than \$6,000,000,000."

Milliken said even the president's own figures when viewed "on the basis of present realities" indicate a surplus of "over \$5,000,000,000."

How Truman Figures
Mr. Truman listed these as the "outstanding facts" of his budget review:

"1. Budget expenditures for the fiscal year 1949 are now estimated at \$42,200,000,000 — substantially higher than was estimated in January—largely because of increases in the national defense program, increased benefits for veterans, and increased tax refunds."

"2. The tax reduction enacted in April will cause receipts for the fiscal year 1949 to be substantially lower than was estimated in January. Budget receipts are now estimated at \$40,700,000,000."

"3. As a result, an operating deficit of \$1,500,000,000 is now anticipated for 1949, compared with the record surplus of \$8,400,000,000 in 1948. This sharp reversal eliminates one of the principal forces that have been restraining further inflation."

"4. The public debt was reduced by \$6,000,000,000 in 1948. Present estimates indicate that no further reduction in the total debt will be possible in 1949."
