

## Crescents Defeat Chiefs in Batfest By Score of 11-10

Crescent City trimmed the Umpqua Chiefs 11 to 10, in a Southern Oregon League baseball game on Finlay Field Sunday afternoon. The visitors teed off on DeBernardi, Roseburg's starting pitcher, for five runs in the third and four in the fifth, adding one each in the eighth and ninth. Roseburg whittled away at the lead, and staged a three-run rally in the last of the ninth, with the tying run in scoring position. But Clausen, visiting hurler, bore down on Montgomery, a pinch hitter, for a strikeout to halt the rally.

High point of the game was the timely hitting by Ward Cummings, Roseburg first baseman, batting in cleanup position. Cummings hit safely four times in five trips to the plate, a homer, triple and two singles, to drive in five runs. Schermer also hit in five runs, driving in three runs. Scott, Crescent City center fielder, hit four for five in Sunday's game but drove in only one run.

DeBernardi lacked control, keeping himself behind the batter, while his fast ball lacked the customary hop. In the third inning he was rapped for six hits, which coupled with one error, scored five runs. Three hits, two walks and an error gave the visitors four runs in the fifth, with Hamilton taking over the mound chores to end the scoring spree with a strikeout. Hamilton kept control until the last two frames, when Crescent City pushed over two runs, one in each inning. Two errors permitted an

unearned run in the eighth. Clausen kept the hits well scattered until the last two frames, when the Roseburg batters began connecting, rapping out three bingles in the eighth and four in the ninth.

## Tuesday's Boxing Card Lists New Names for Fans

Tickets go on sale today for Roseburg's fight card of the month, slated for tomorrow night at the Roseburg Armory. Boxing Promoter Rudy Schintzauer announced that new ticket prices would be in effect for Tuesday's bouts. Representing a 25 per cent reduction, the three prices are \$1.80 ringside, \$1.20 general admission, \$1.75 for children. Tickets may be purchased in advance at Wally's Pastime, the Grand Cafe, and the J.V. Sporting Goods Store.

Another Roseburg boxing newcomer, and reputedly a good one, is Kenny Cass, slated to appear on the six-round special event. Cass, who has lived in Roseburg less than a week, returned from Guam two months ago where he was employed as a civilian worker. While in the Pacific, Cass fought the light-heavyweight champion of the Marianas, once to a draw and losing the second on a split decision. Cass is strictly a West Coast product, coming to Roseburg via Portland, Seattle, Vancouver and San Francisco.

Before turning professional, Cass was an outstanding amateur boxer. In 1945 he was Oregon's Golden Gloves heavyweight champ. Since his punch-for-pay switch, he has fought 14 times, winning seven, losing six, and drawing once. His opponent for tomorrow night has not yet been announced but the local promoter said a suitable opponent will be picked from Portland Manager Wiley Spivey's fight stable.

Card Offers Lots of Action  
The rest of the card is shaping up as one of the best offered local fight enthusiasts. Three of the ten fighters are local boys and two of those are heavy favorites. Fighting in the semi-wind-up spot is Bucky O'Connor, another recent addition to the Roseburg fight circle. Of 25 professional fights, Bucky has won 21 and lost 4. Two of his losses were to such big names in Pacific Coast boxing as Joey Chavez, Los Angeles, and San Francisco light-weight "Kid" Flores. Bucky will meet the Portland colored boy, Sammy Benton, a regular preliminary performer on Rose City fight cards.

The third Roseburg fighter is Jack Parrott, who will appear on the four-round curtain raiser. This will be Parrott's first professional fight, after a successful amateur career.

Popular Tony Lacetti of Portland will fight on the second four-round preliminary, meeting Salem's Jack Hoffer. Lacetti has been a consistent winner since advancing from the featherweight ranks. He lost his first Roseburg bout, succumbing to a seventh-round TKO administered by Babe Fenton. But in his next appearance as a lightweight, he easily dispatched Bill Tucker, Winchester, in 36 seconds of the initial round.

## Swedes Share Olympiad Glory With Americans

LONDON, Aug. 16.—(AP)—American athletes were far and away the biggest point winners in the Olympic games which ended here Saturday, but it was Sweden which almost stole the show.

The versatile Swedes finished second to the Americans in all sports point totals as well as in the chief single sport, track and field.

The United States triumph was expected, as befitting one of the world's biggest, richest, best fed nations. But the spectacular showing of the Swedes was amazing for a country with less than 7,000,000 population.

In scoring 333 points to America's 662, the Swedes surpassed such bigger, traditionally athletic nations as France, which was third with 230.5 points, Hungary which was fourth with 201.5.
