

Feed Potatoes For Livestock Offered To Local Feeders

Feed potatoes for livestock are available to local livestock feeders through the Agricultural Conservation Association office, Roseburg, according to word received from the Production and Marketing Administration headquarters in Portland Monday.

The PMA organization is charged with carrying out the program set up by Congress to support prices of surplus potatoes and dispose of them for use in other than the regular channels of trade. The offer of feed potatoes is part of the disposal program made necessary by surpluses in Washington, Idaho and Malheur County, Oregon.

"Early" or "intermediate" potatoes being harvested in these areas now will not keep under storage or maintain quality when shipped long distances. Demand for processing into starch, alcohol, or for dehydration is not sufficient to absorb all production above market need. Livestock feeders can obtain an excellent low-cost feed and help avoid waste by ordering now.

Feeders may order carlots only in minimum loadings of 360 hundred pounds sacks. Orders are acceptable only on contract certifying use for livestock feed and accompanied by a certified check for the full value of the order. Cost to the feeder for the present is only 30c per hundred-weight delivered at the nearest siding.

Contracts should be made out at the Agricultural Conservation Association office, 321 Pacific Building, Roseburg. Heavy penalties attach to the use of these potatoes for other than livestock feed.

Funds Denied For Housing Project in Flood Area

PORTLAND, Aug. 17.—(AP)—The Oregon Journal said yesterday that Senator Cordon's office reported a proposal to use \$6,000,000 for prefabricated low-rent housing here has been rejected.

The newspaper talked with Cordon's office in Washington by telephone. The \$6,000,000 is what the Housing and Home Finance Agency has left of \$10,000,000 for emergency housing in this flood area. The other \$4,000,000 was allocated for trailers.

The Journal said the Reconstruction Finance Corporation was reconsidering a plan to use part of its emergency loan fund to back local low-cost rental housing.

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U. S. Exports To Russia Decline

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17.—(AP)—American exports to Russia dropped under \$50,000 in June. This compared with \$200,000 in May and a monthly average of \$6,900,000 earlier in the year.

American purchases from Russia amounted to \$7,400,000 in June, about the same as in May.

The figures were disclosed in the Commerce Department's regular monthly report on foreign trade. This showed June exports to the 12 countries in the Soviet sphere were \$8,400,000 compared with \$5,700,000 in May. The increase was largely because of higher shipments to Finland.

The total June exports to eastern Europe, however, was less than a third of the average monthly shipments in first quarter of this year, because of the closer security now given to exports which might have potential military use.

Secretary of Commerce Sawyer emphasized that there is no outright ban on shipments to Russia—merely a closer screening of goods having a war potential to Russia or her satellites.

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Construction Of McNary Dam Begins

UMATILLA, Ore., Aug. 17.—(AP)—Initial construction work on McNary Dam in the Columbia River began yesterday as project Engineer Robert J. Jenks ordered water pumped from the north shore cofferdam and lock excavation.

Materials have been flowing to the project site in larger quantities the past week in readiness for the start of rock excavation and plant construction in the area.

Jenks said drilling in the rock and spillway sectors would begin as soon as the water is pumped from the north shore installation.

The work chart calls for increasing employment through the fall months.

An estimated 100 men will be on the job Sept. 1 and a month later the work force is expected to reach 250. By January 1 the crew may number 500 and eventually increase to 1,000 men.

Hiring will depend upon weather conditions prevailing when the contractors reach the concrete pouring stage.

Jenks, 38, and employee of the Guy F. Atkinson Company, was an engineer in the Grand Coulee dam and later at Mud Mountain project near Seattle. He also shared in engineering at the Hoover Dam repair work.

Jenks is in charge of field work for the \$21,648,763 contract awarded by the army engineers jointly to three firms: Guy F. Atkinson Co., Ostrander Construction Co., and J. A. Jones Construction Co.

Army to Start Taking Drafts in November

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17.—(AP)—The Army expects to start taking its first batch of about 15,000 inductees under the new draft law early in November.

Maj. Gen. John E. Dahlquist estimated the drafts will start coming into training camps between November 1 and 15.

This estimate is based on a calculation that selective service will need about 60 days to make the inductions after it gets a manpower requisition order from the Army.

"We must put in the requisition in the next week or 10 days," Dahlquist told a reporter. "Our people are working directly and

informally with selective service things so that they can deliver and we are trying to coordinate men when we ask them."

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
