Two States Set For Battle Over Colorado River

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17.—(AP)—All signs point to a showdown battle in the next Congress on rival claims of Arizona and California to Colorado river water. The Arizona bill to authorize the multi-million dollar central Arizona reclamation project and the California proposal to refer the water dispute to the Supreme Court were both waiting committee action when Congress adjourned.

Both, however, will be renewed next session. In the meantime, it is indicated both sides are preparing for battle. Press statements and arguments in the Congressional Record appeared during the special session with the same regularity as during the earlier session of Congress.

Republican nomination of California's Governor Earl Warren for vice-president aroused speculation as to whether his election would have any influence on the final decision if he should be elected.

Gland Tissues From Cows Increase Height of Japs

TOKYO, Aug. 17.—(AP)—Japanese medical scientists have started, with some apparent early success, to make short people taller by grafting pituitary gland tissue from cows to the thighs of the patients.

Experiments on 45 patients, averaging about 20 years old, the researchers reported, showed they had grown 4.10 to 4.5 of an inch in one month. The operations were performed at Kyushu University hospital. Six of the operations were reported failures.

In one spectacular case a man grew nearly three inches in four months, the scientists said, and his mental activity increased. Before the operation he was said to have been able to write only elementary Japanese phonetics. Now, they reported, he can write junior phonetics with ease.

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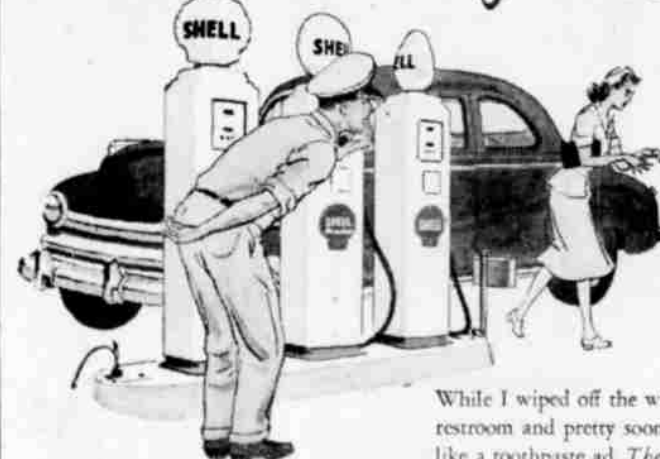
