Hughy Euclat McClung, 52, died suddenly Tuesday morning, Aug. 17, while at work in his Upholstery and Royal Mattress Co. shop on N. Stephens Street. He was born April 31, 1896, in Waco, Texas, and came to Roseburg a year ago. He was a veteran of World War I and was a member of the American Legion. He was also a member of the Nazarene Church and of the Odd Fellows Lodge of Oklahoma City. Surviving are his widow, Rena Mae, and a son, Odus Leo, Roseburg; two brothers, J. A. McClung, Medford; Vern McClung, San Spring, Okla.; two sisters, Mrs. H. L. Wadkins and Mrs. Viola Pickett, also of Sand Spring, and two grandchildren. Funeral services will be announced later by the Roseburg Funeral Home pending arrival of relatives from Oklahoma.

W. E. Burns, Former S. P. Civil Engineer, Passes

PORTLAND, Aug. 18—(AP)—Walter Elliot (Dan) Burns, 69, who pioneered the auto parts trade in Salem, died here last night at his home. Prior to establishing the auto

parts store in 1920 at Salem, later branching to Portland, he was a civil engineer for the Southern Pacific Railway. He was in charge of bridge construction for the Oregon and California division, erecting many of the spans along the route. Surviving are the widow and a daughter, Ann Reed Burns, an Associated Press editor in Portland.

Porter S. King, Veteran Timber Cruiser, Dies

DALLAS, Ore., Aug. 18—(AP)—Porter S. King, 83, former assistant state forester and veteran timber cruiser, died here yesterday. His forestry career began in Columbia county in 1909. After work for the Oregon-California Land Agency, he joined the state service in 1921 and in 1930 was named assistant forester in charge of protection. He retired in 1936, later opening a cruising office here.

Soviet Closing Schools
Meanwhile, diplomatic authorities are puzzling over indications that the Soviet Union is closing all the schools it had operated in many countries for the children of its diplomats and other employees abroad.

It was in connection with the closing of such a school in New York that Mrs. Kosenkina and her colleagues, Mr. and Mrs. Mikhail Samarin, decided they would prefer to stay in this country rather than go back to Russia. But on July 31 more than 300 Soviet citizens—mostly school age children and their mothers—did sail from New York on a Russian motor ship. Authorities here assume that a similar return to Russia is being required by the S-viet government of many hundreds of dependents of Russian diplomats and other employees around the world. The Russian motive in all this is what has official Washington puzzled.

Most speculation centers on the possibility that the Soviets want to prevent the "contamination" of their school age children by any contact with western democratic ideas.

Another possibility often suggested by diplomats, however, is that by having the wives and children at home, the Soviet government's effect holds them hostages against any desire of Russian diplomats to renounce Communism.

Very little credence is placed by officials here in the theory that Moscow might be clearing the decks for war. The main reason given for discounting this idea is that the Russians are permitting childless families and those with only pre-school age children to remain abroad.

Moser, White Held On Charge of Murder

White was arrested shortly after midnight Saturday morning by Patrolmen Lloyd Larsen, Don Starmer and Charles Long, after Moffitt had been found in the alley south of Flood Street between Stephens and Pine, about 10 p. m. Friday. Officer Bill Olsen arrested Moser, along with his wife, on drunkenness charges Sunday afternoon.

Baird and Harrell attended the autopsy conducted on Moffitt's body in Eugene Monday by Dr. Howard Richardson, director of the State Police Crime Detection Laboratory, in conjunction with the University of Oregon Medical School in Portland. Dr. Richardson's report on the cause of death will be announced later, along with a report on tests of blood found on clothing of both Moser and White.

Robbery Alleged Motive

The complaint on which Moser and White were arraigned alleges that on Aug. 13, they "were then and there engaged in the commission of robbery of one Willis Moffitt by... unlawfully and feloniously taking certain divers paper currency and coins... the denominations, kinds and amounts being unknown to the complainant, from the person of the said Willis Moffitt and against his will, by violence to his person." And "while then and there so engaged in the commission of said robbery by their acting in the manner aforesaid then and there purposely, unlaw-

fully and feloniously did kill the said Willis Moffitt with their fists, or by other means, unknown to the complainant, thereby inflicting such mortal wounds and injuries on the person of the said Willis Moffitt and from which said wounds and injuries the said Willis Moffitt on the 15th day of August, 1948, did die."

Funeral services for Moffitt were held this morning at the Roseburg Funeral Home, with Rev. H. P. Sconce of the Baptist Church officiating. Interment followed in Odd Fellows Cemetery. Moffitt was born of pioneer parents in Roseburg 80 years ago and had lived in Roseburg all of his life. He was the last survivor of a family of 13 children. Two sons and a daughter survive him.

Maritime Strike Threat Hovers Over Scheduled Parley
SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 18—(AP)—Union leaders announced longshore operations in San Francisco will be shut down from 7 o'clock tonight until 8 o'clock tomorrow for a stop-work meeting. They will gather to hear a report on the findings of a presidential fact-finding committee which questioned the CIO Longshore leaders and the employers in the Pacific Coast maritime contract row last week. The Waterfront Employers' Association called the stop-work meeting a violation of contract and threatened to register a complaint with the National Labor Relations Board. Employer spokesmen contended the men could hold a day and a night meeting, without keeping any workers from their jobs. James Kearney, president of Local 10 of the Union, said the longshoremen would also discuss the pending NLRB poll among five maritime unions involved in the coastwide dispute. The poll will allow union members to accept or reject a "final" employer contract offer. Leaders of all five unions have announced they will strike at midnight Sept. 2, when the government's anti-strike injunction expires, if no settlement is reached by then.

Some said one or the other ought to be prosecuted for perjury. Then last Monday, Hiss was questioned again. The committee proposed a lie detector test. Hiss said last night he would mail his answer today.
