Interesting Talks
Heard at Meeting
Of Toastmasters

Highlighting the Tuesday evening meeting of the Roseburg Toastmasters Club at the Umpqua Hotel was the recording of all the main addresses. Recording equipment owned by Harold Horn was used for the first time as the four speakers addressed club members on a variety of topics.

Bob Harvie, a delegate to the recent International Toastmasters Convention at San Francisco, gave a brief account of the social and educational aspects of the affair. Emphasizing the low price for the two tours on which he was taken, Harvie said that as a Scotchman, he was greatly pleased. A bus trip around the East Bay area of Oakland, and an air trip to Reno and back cost the Toastmasters less than \$25 apiece.

In reference to the principal meetings of the convention, Harvie said the main theme was educational.

"Besides learning how to make better speeches, we were taught how to teach others," Harvie said.

He said the value of the Toastmasters' training manual was emphasized for persons learning how to speak well and correctly. In an attempt to spread the gospel of better speaking, Harvie suggested the local Toastmasters meet with Roseburg educators in an attempt to work out an advanced speech program for the upper grades.

For City Improvement

Carl Pirman gave a five-minute talk on the "Face Lifting of Roseburg." Beginning with the significance of the words "rose" and "burg," Pirman went on to point out the many attractive qualities of this city. However, he also listed several ways in which the city could be improved so as to appear more attractive to tourists and residents alike.

Pirman's five points were: Restricted residential districts; installation of traffic lights, especially on Jackson Street; four-lane highways at both ends of the city limits; new or repaired sidewalks; better placement of city-owned garbage cans.

Life Sketches Heard

Delbert Parker, giving an autobiographical sketch, said he was born in Salem, Oregon, in 1913 on his older brother's fifth birthday. Before he was 9 years old, he lived in Salem, Portland and Eugene. At that age, he moved to Roseburg with his mother and step-father and received the rest of his education in the Roseburg schools.

Since the early 1930's, he has worked in the tire business in this city, first for his step-father, then with another tire dealer. He was married in 1940 and took his bride to an old house which he has completely remodeled. During the war years he converted a barn on his property into a house.

Another life sketch was given by Bill Lindsell, who said he was born in Hoquiam, Washington, in 1916. When he was 4 years old, he moved to Aberdeen, then in 1930 to California. However, he said his family stayed less than a year in California, primarily because they missed the rain, green hills and forest land of the northern state. He spent his high school years in Seattle where he attended that city's Garfield High.

Lindsell spoke with pride of his high school alma mater, remarking on the democratic aspects of the student-controlled type of government, one of the first of its kind in the Northwest. He attended the University of Washington. After completing his first year he worked his way to Europe on a Norwegian fruit boat. For six months he "bummed" his way around the continent on a bicycle. He returned to Seattle and was graduated from the university in 1940. He was married that same year. Since completing his college career, Lindsell has worked in the forests. He said that was his principal reason for moving to Roseburg—to be near the great-



est stand of timber in the United States.

Surprise guest of the evening was Blair Alderman, district chairman from Eugene. With him was Dr. A. K. Spencer of the Alhambra, Calif., Toastmasters Club.
