

Barkley Voices Farm Argument For Demo Cause

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Aug. 18.—(P)—Senator Barkley (D-Ky.) said today farmers must choose in November between a Democratic administration with "40-cent cattle and 30-cent hogs" and a Republican regime with lower farm prices.

The Democratic vice-presidential nominee spoke on the "Democratic Day" program of the Illinois State Fair. It was his opening campaign talk.

Gov. Earl Warren of California, the Republican vice-presidential candidate, will have an opportunity to answer Barkley from the same platform tomorrow.

Barkley said that if farmers vote Republican they will take a chance of "putting the economy

of this nation, including agriculture, back into the hands of those whose short sightedness brought you to the brink of disaster a decade and a half ago."

Mentioning that cattle then sold for from 4 cents a pound and hogs for three, he added: "We have the right to ask you not to allow some temporary prejudice or inconvenience under which you may have suffered as a result of total war to divert your attention from the great advancement made by American agriculture and the whole American economy during the 16 years of Democratic administration."

Barkley credited President Truman with having halted an effort by congressional Republicans to "destroy" farm cooperatives.

He said the Republican leadership had begun an investigation into the question of cutting off tax exemptions for cooperatives. But he said a "strong statement" by the president in favor of keeping present tax exemptions caused the GOP to drop the matter.

World Christians Get Summons To Fight Communism

LONDON, Aug. 18.—(P)—Translated into more than 100 languages, a call to Christians to oppose Communism was dispatched yesterday to all corners of the earth. It was sent by the Lambeth Conference.

The conference report was published in the form of a volume presenting the views of 329 archbishops of the Anglican and associated churches who met in London for five weeks.

It was the first Lambeth conference—a deliberative church

body wielding great influence but possessing no legislative authority—since 1930. The Archbishop of Canterbury, the Most Rev. G. F. Fisher, was its president.

The conference adopted a resolution stating it is recognized that many practicing Christians believe in some political doctrines of Communism and that such belief is not inconsistent with their religion.

Nevertheless, the bishops and archbishops, including the highest authorities of the Church of England and the Protestant Episcopal Church of the United States, were vigorous in their opposition to Marxian Communism, which, they said, is contrary to Christian faith and practice.

Russian Demand For Girl Turned Down by Sweden

STOCKHOLM, Aug. 18.—(P)—The newspaper Dagens Nyheter yesterday identified the "Swedish Kosenkina" as Lydia Makarova, and said the 19-year-old girl who refuses to go back to Russia is a musical prodigy.

The case is causing a sensation in Sweden. It parallels the case of Mrs. Oksana Kosenkina, Soviet teacher who leaped from the third story window of the Soviet Consulate in New York last week.

A Swedish foreign office spokesman said the Soviet em-

bassy here had asked repeatedly that the girl be sent back to Russia. He said the foreign office had declined these requests and told the Russian embassy to "leave the girl alone."

Dagens Nyheter published an interview with the girl, who said she had fled to Sweden in 1944 after her mother had died in Leningrad. At the time she was 15 and considered a musical prodigy, she said. She has continued her studies in Sweden and will give her first piano recital at Stockholm's concert hall Jan. 29, the account said.

Soviet Bids Rejected

Lydia dreams of going to Paris to continue her studies, but she is afraid to leave Sweden and the protection she has had here, the newspaper said. It quoted her:

"I have taken root in Sweden.

I have learned Swedish. I like it here and I will never return to the old country."

Lydia said the Soviet ambassador had sent word to her to visit him at the embassy two years ago. She telephoned him and was told he had a letter from her father. He refused to send it to her. After that she has received only a post card and three birthday cables, urging her to go to the embassy and get his letters. She never went.

Lydia is under constant watch by her friends and neighbors at Dalaro, where she is living.

The girl applied for an alien's emergency passport which was granted after "careful consideration," an alien commission source said.

Tito's Aide Slain Trying To Flee to Romania

BELGRADE, Yugoslavia, Aug. 19.—(P)—Borba, official organ of the Yugoslav Communist party, reported yesterday that Col. Gen. Arso Jovanovic, former chief of staff of the Yugoslav Army, had been shot and killed in a pre-dawn attempt to flee to Romania.

The report said Jovanovic and three others attempted to get across the border six days ago while pretending to be on a wild boar hunt. It said border guards saw the group hustling toward the border and opened fire when one of the fleeing group started shooting after being ordered to halt.

Jovanovic was one of Premier Marshall Tito's top-ranking military men.

More Refugees Brave Ocean to Reach America

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Aug. 19.—(P)—Two more parties of European refugees have arrived in the New World after perilous crossings of the Atlantic in small vessels.

Seventy-five Poles arrived in St. John's late last night aboard the 63-ton vessel Ostervag, after navigating from Stornoway, Scotland, by watch, compass and an old-fashioned sextant. The crossing took 12 days.

Another group of 15 Estonians dropped anchor off North Carolina after an eight-week crossing in an auxiliary fishing craft.

The Ostervag party made the trip against the advice of mariners and customs officials in Scotland who cleared the ship only for Sweden, whence it originally sailed.

Exploding Ammunition Routs Swiss Villagers

ALTDORF, Switzerland, Aug. 18.—(P)—All 800 inhabitants were evacuated from the village of Goeschenen today while fire in a nearby mountain redoubt began exploding stored ammunition.


Altdorf, making this announcement, said no casualties had been reported, but telephone communications with the village, at the north end of the St. Gotthard tunnel, were broken.

Rail traffic was halted on both sides of the Swiss-Italian frontier and was rerouted through the Simplon Tunnel. Villagers at first scurried for safety to air raid cellars, mountain gorges and the St. Gotthard Tunnel itself, while troops fought the fire.

Polio Cases Increasing In Los Angeles County


LOS ANGELES, Aug. 19.—(P)—The Health Department reported yesterday 33 new cases of infantile paralysis in Los Angeles county during the preceding 24 hours.

Total for the year is now 977, with 43 fatalities, said Dr. Sidney Clark, chief of the polio coordinating council, of which 347 cases have been reported this month.



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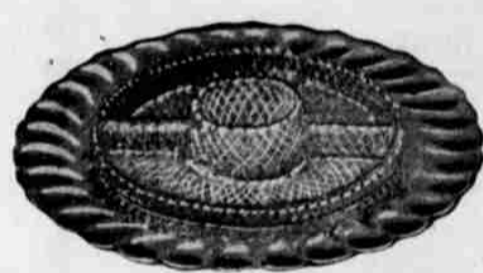
