

Angels Crowding Oaks for 2nd Spot In Coast League

The Los Angeles Angels are moving nearer to second place in the Pacific Coast League this week but first place San Francisco keeps its distance by winning, too.

The Angels beat Oakland last night, 4-1, as Lynn allowed the Oaks only four hits, pitching his 16th win as the league's winningest hurler. The Angel victory dropped Oakland two games back of San Francisco, leaving Los Angeles five behind.

San Francisco's Werle gave Hollywood sparse pickin' on five hits as the Seals triumphed, 4-1. The loser was Gerbrian.

Seattle bested San Diego 7-3, the Padres rising up in the seventh and ninth innings after the Rainiers had been breezing with

a 6-0 lead. Schanz won his third pitching start, against one loss.

San Diego's descent into the second division was offset a bit by reports from San Diego that Jack Graham, the 45-home-run hitter, is working out and may get back in the lineup next week. He hit a few out of the park in practice. Graham has been out of action since he was beamed in Los Angeles July 25.

Sacramento turned the tables on Portland, 3-1, last night as pitcher Freitas scattered eight Beaver hits. The Solons drove Don Johnson, Portland starting hurler, to the showers with one run in the first inning. Mooty took over with the bases loaded, walked in a run, then blanked Sacramento except for Jennings' sixth inning homer.
