U. S. Demands Recall Of Soviet Consul Lomakin

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York and had been written by Mrs. Kosenkina. One was written at the time she decided not to go back to Russia and one little more than a week ago when she jumped out of the consulate window in New York.

The evidence against Lomakin was based on testimony given to American authorities by Mrs. Kosenkina, who is now in a New York hospital suffering with injuries she received in her leap for freedom.

In general, these assertions by her, as described in the State Department note, covered these main points:

1. The interview which she gave to the press Aug. 7, after Lomakin had forced her return from the Tolstoy foundation refugee farm, "was arranged by the consulate general and . . . she was instructed to make false statements to the effect that she had been kidnapped."

2. She went to the farm, according to her testimony and of a number of other persons, "voluntarily, and stayed there of her own free will."

3. According to her reports to American authorities, she wrote Lomakin in New York telling him where she was "but denied stating that she was kidnapped."

The American note then asserted that Lomakin had, in effect, misled his own government so that the protests which the Soviets made officially through Foreign Minister Molotov and Ambassador S. Panyushkin "have been based upon misinformation."

Investigation Prevented. Moreover, the note charged that the consul general had "hindered the investigation of the competent police officials by refusing to allow them to interview Mrs. Kosenkina at the time she was in the consul's control."

"This action was the more serious," the United States note asserted, "in view of the subsequent statements by Mrs. Kosenkina to the effect that she jumped from the window of the consulate general in order to avoid having to return to the Soviet Union."

"In addition to the statement made by Mrs. Kosenkina that she was compelled to make in a press interview false statements which had been dictated to her, the consul general has himself made or issued statements to the press which, in view of all the evidence available, the Department of State can only conclude were deliberately designed to mislead the American public in regard to a serious charge involving the United States government."

"The United States government considers that Consul General Lomakin's conduct constitutes an abuse of the prerogatives of his position and a gross violation of the internationally accepted standards governing the conduct of foreign officials."

last stronghold of Greek Guerrillas Falls

ATHENS, Aug. 20 (AP)—The last Communist guerrilla defense line in the Grammos Mountains virtually collapsed today and Kalfa, the rebels' last stronghold, fell to Army troops, a Greek General Staff spokesman announced.

The army opened a determined offensive this morning against the last-ditch rebel positions in the Grammos range.

The Athens government had been halting the Grammos campaign as already won, but the staff spokesman told of stiffening guerrilla resistance in an area of some 100 square miles still held by the forces under Communist Markos Vafiades.

Business Warned To Watch Out For Overseas Requests

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20 (AP)—The Army said today it is warning business and industry to be wary of requests for information coming from overseas, especially from Russian-dominated areas.

The warnings are being given to businessmen, officials of key industries, and civic organizations such as chambers of commerce and trade organizations.

Army information officers over the U. S. were told confidentially in June to contact those who might receive requests for information. They were told to discuss with such persons the possible use by potential enemies of seemingly harmless information about recent developments.

Many information requests have come from Germans in the Russian-occupied zone, particularly the Leipzig sector, the army said.

German individuals, firms, schools and museums have made direct requests to American civic organizations and business firms during the past several months.

Communist Rebels Raid Malay Rubber Estate

SINGAPORE, Aug. 20 (AP)—An estimated 300 Communist rebels raided a South Johore rubber estate early today. Early reports indicated it was the largest attack of the three-month Malay revolt.

Advice said a European planter, three Asiatic guards and two rebels were killed in the skirmish, and six guards wounded. The insurgents were reported to have burned buildings on the Sembrong Estate.

Cattle Rustlers Being Nabbed in Washington

OLYMPIA, Wash., Aug. 20 (AP)—State Agriculture Director Fred J. Martin said today a "crack-down on cattle rustling" had brought several arrests in Pierce County, Washington.

Much of the work is conducted by State Department of Agriculture inspectors who are authorized to make arrests.

"They have already done a lot of good in this area and we are going to keep at it until we stamp out this rustling," Martin said.

Lowest Unemployment Since War's End

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 20 (AP)—Oregon's unemployment in August, amounting to 23,000, is at the lowest mark since the end of the war, the state unemployment compensation commission said today.

The figure is less than 4 per cent of the 600,000 persons now holding jobs.

Of the total unemployed, 15,500 are in the Portland area, and 6,900 in the rest of the state.
