

## Bunion Derby From Eugene to Salem Scheduled Sept. 5

Shoe salesman, here's the chance of a lifetime!

The first annual Eugene-Salem Bunion Derby Association race is slated to begin Sept. 5, stated an announcement from Association headquarters in Eugene. The 75-mile walking race, the distance from Eugene to Salem, is advertising Lane and Douglas Counties participation in the Oregon State Fair, Sept. 6 to 12.

Advance publicity in Eugene has attracted several contestants, competing for the \$2000 in prizes. Each competitor, posting a \$100 entry fee, will advertise some sponsor, similar in style to the walking sandwich board men. Three top money prizes, plus a host of lap prizes, will be awarded the winners. First prize is \$1000, second prize \$500, third prize \$250, plus \$25 lap prizes.

The only rules governing the race are that contestants must not wander off the beaten highway and go no faster than a walk. They only food and drink will be provided by an accompanying pilot car. The race will be a continuous affair, with no organized rest periods. A physician will accompany the racers. Opening ceremonies will be held in Eugene the morning of the race. The racers will be feted in Salem the following day where they will be the guests at a banquet.

To date, no entries have applied from Douglas County. Race spokesmen invited local walking experts to enter the derby by sending in their names, addresses.

## Brecheen Blanks Cincinnati Reds

Brecheen, the St. Louis Cardinals' ace hurler, pitched one of his best games of the year yesterday, shutting out the Cincinnati Reds on four scattered hits, 4-0. It was his 15th triumph of the year. The victory pushed the third place Cardinals within two games of the leading Boston Braves.

Brecheen struck out seven to wrest the strikeout leadership from Cincinnati's Blackwell, 107 to 103.

The Philadelphia Athletics regained second place in the American League race, turning back the Boston Red Sox, 10-3, in Boston. ## Hessell Will Take On 'Balkans Bully' In Saturday Card

Tiger Nenoff, the so-called "Bully of the Balkans," will provide Douglas County wrestling fans with something new in the way of rough-and-tumble grappling. The villainous Bulgarian, who wears handlebar mustachios will make his local debut in the three-fall curtain-raiser at the Roseburg Armory Saturday night—against Gordon Hessell.

Hessell is just ripe to tear some meanie limb from limb, after his defeat in a coast-to-coast heavyweight title tilt to Tex Hager here last week—a spectacular and thrill-packed battle. Nenoff possesses one of the most feared armbreakers holds in the business to go along with his customary illegal tactics.

Another preliminary three-fall engagement will send Bruno Angelo, who downed Mike Casey here last week, against a talented young Britisher, Danno MacDonald. Fans will recall the impressive showing young Danno made here several weeks ago.

The headliner, however, will be a \$200 challenge match in which Erik Holmback, 262-pound Seattle Swede, will meet Angelo and Hessell. Although the muscular giant from the north will vie against both men, he has posted the challenge to read that he must pin the shoulders of both opponents, one at a time, within a 30-minute period.

Holmback is a heavyweight matman out of work, claiming the lighter grapplers, the light-heavyweights, have virtually put the heavier men out of business—for no good reason. He claims that the lighter men do lots of running around and exhibiting spectacular maneuvers, but "just aren't tough enough to stand up against a good heavy—and I'm a good one." Erik claims. At least he is willing to risk \$200 of his own money on his opinions.

Angelo will be the first to meet the giant that boasts a 57-inch chest and 20-inch biceps, and if Angelo is downed, Hessell will carry on the remainder of the 30 minutes.

Butchers, Aiding Strike, Suspend Sales Three Days

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 19.—(AP)—The butchers joined the housewife in a fight to bring down the price of meat.

About 15 west Philadelphia shops have signs in their windows announcing their cooperation with a housewives' three-day buyer strike starting today.

The signs read:

"This store will sell no meat on Thursday, Friday and Saturday in support of a meat strike against high prices."

Cooperation of the butchers was obtained by more than 5,000 housewives who canvassed the neighborhood and circulated petitions.

## Jobless Payment Claims Reporting Cut to Bi-Weekly

Bi-weekly reporting for unemployed claimants at local offices has been adopted by the State Unemployment Compensation Commission as an economy measure, administrator Silas Gaiser announced.

"The Congressional action cutting federal security appropriations has forced many states to take this action," explained Mr. Gaiser. "With our local and central office personnel down 20 to 25 per cent, we are cutting our workload by asking claimants to report only once in two weeks."

The new program will go into effect with the week starting August 30. Claimants during the preceding week will be assigned definite reporting days during the first two-week period August 30-September 10. This procedure also will be followed when new claims are filed.

Readjustment allowances for unemployed veterans, also handled by state agencies by agreement with the Federal Government under the GI Bill of Rights, will be subject to the same bi-weekly reporting.

Instructions issued.

When claimants report at local offices, they will be entitled to file claims for either or both of the two previous weeks. They also will pick up checks for weeks for which claims were filed previously.

"This does not mean that claimants must stay away from local offices between reporting days," warned the administrator. "they may report daily if there is a chance of a job in their line. The employment service with a limited staff will continue to do everything possible to bring workers and jobs together—we are merely trying to streamline—we are merely trying to streamline time and effort."

Weekly reporting of claimants has prevailed in Oregon and most other states since unemployment compensation began in 1932. Only recently because of budget cuts and other limitations many states have been forced to adopt the more economical method of taking claims and distributing checks every two weeks.

The jury heard Bailey's widow assert her husband was killed from ambush on the Pioneer Loop Road by a man she recognized instantly as Sooter last Saturday.

She said she was riding in a truck with her husband at the time. One pellet grazed her arm, inflicting only a bruise. Bailey was killed instantly.

Sooter was found on the courthouse steps here suffering from self-inflicted head wounds after the slaying. Hospital attendants said he was recovering.
