Reservists Given Warning on Losing Draft Exemptions

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20.—(AP)—The Navy warned its organized reservists today that if they miss as few as five weekly drills a year they'll lose their draft exemptions.

At the same time, it announced that young volunteer reservists (who do not attend regular drills and are not draft exempt) can compete for appointment to the Naval Academy if they have had 14 days of active duty before the examination date next April.

Under the draft law, members of an organized reserve unit are exempt only as long as they take part satisfactorily in drills and training.

Secretary of the Navy John L. Sullivan defined "satisfactory participation" today as not more than a 10 per cent absence from the full 48 scheduled drills a year.

And everyone must take the two weeks of annual training duty unless an "acceptable excuse," such as sickness, is presented, he added.

Furthermore, a young man otherwise likely to be drafted, had better watch his step around his reserve unit.

Three-Season Fur Ensemble Created

CHICAGO, Aug. 21 (AP)—By adding, subtracting and zipping a zipper, Sam Stein has turned a fur coat into three wraps which can be worn ten months of the year.

Stein, a Chicago furrier, sees his design as an answer to the husband whose budget wince when the wife wants a new coat each season.

The coat, termed "the three season fur ensemble," consists first of a fur coat. When the weather turns warmer, off comes the skirt—leaving a versatile jacket.

The in-between season, Stein adds a colored wool skirt trimmed with fur. This zips onto the jacket and creates the third ensemble.

Stein said "I'm working on the knowledge that a fur coat never wears out. It is discarded or removed because the woman is tired of wearing it year after year. This way she won't get tired as soon."

And when she does, she can order still another wool skirt in any color of her choice.

National Vice-President Stevens of BRT Dies

PORTLAND, Aug. 21 (AP)—Charles William Stevens, 65, national vice-president of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, died in a hospital yesterday after a four-month illness.

A former train conductor, he was elected general chairman of the Brotherhood in 1929 and moved here from Centralia, Wash. He took up the study of law, and as deputy vice-president of the Union, acted on many arbitration boards in railway labor disputes on the Pacific Coast.

Stevens was promoted to national vice-president of the Brotherhood only last January.

Reared in Spokane, he is survived by relatives there: his mother, Mrs. Anisa Stevens, two sisters, Mrs. Alvin Cooley and Mrs. William Scott.

His widow, a Portland teacher; a son, J. Hugh Stevens, Portland; and a brother, Claude D. Stevens, Seattle, also survive.

Recruiter Wins Voter Registration Right

PORTLAND, Aug. 20 (AP)—Pete Dalia Jr., Navy recruiting officer stationed here since 1947, was a registered voter today.

Election officials allowed him to register after attorney William B. Murray brought a writ of mandamus in Dalia's behalf. The registrar's office said it was complying with an Aug. 5 ruling of the District Attorney regarding registration of servicemen.

In filing the suit yesterday, Murray said he wanted to clarify "confusion" over the issue of where servicemen should vote.
