

Boston Red Sox Slash Cleveland Lead to Half-Game

By JOE REICHLER Associated Press Sports Writer The rampaging Boston Red Sox owe much of their amazing uphill climb to their great key-stone combination — shortstop Vern Stephens and Bobby Doerr.

Sparked by the brilliant all-around play of this pair, the Red Sox today were in second place in the American League standings, only half a game behind the pace-setting Cleveland Indians.

Stephens and Doerr accounted for three of Boston's four runs yesterday as the Sox whipped the Washington Senators, 4-1. It was Boston's fourth straight over the Senators and the 10th victory in their last 12 games.

It proved a profitable Sunday for the Sox as the Indians dropped a doubleheader to the cellar-dwelling Chicago White Sox, 8-1 and 4-3, to lose a game and a half to Boston.

The red hot New York Yankees also gained ground, whipping the Philadelphia Athletics, 10-0, to climb within two games of the Indians. The A's, now in fourth place, are three games off the pace.

Doerr was the big gun of the Red Sox' victory yesterday. The Oregonian hammered his 23rd home run with Stephens aboard in the third inning off Thompson to put the Sox ahead 2-0. Doerr walked in the eighth and tallied one of Boston's two runs in that inning.

The Yankees made it three in a row over the A's as Raschi, an old Philadelphia nemesis, formerly of the Portland Beavers, pitched a four-hit shutout for his 17th victory against five defeats. Raschi helped his own cause with a bases-loaded double and a single to drive in three runs.

Feller Routed in 6th The White Sox not only whipped the Indians twice, but knocked out Bobby Feller in the sixth inning of the first game. The Chicago added insult to injury when Seery, who was discarded by the Tribe, poked a two-run homer to sink the Indians in the second game.

Blasting Newhouse for eight hits in less than five innings, including a home run by Priddy, the St. Louis Browns walloped the Detroit Tigers, 10-1. Sanford permitted only three hits for his ninth victory. It was Newhouse's ninth defeat. He has won 15.

The Boston Braves moved two games ahead of the runner-up Brooklyn Dodgers, coming from behind to win, 4-3, on rookie Clint Conatser's eighth inning home run with one on.

The Pittsburgh Pirates ruined the St. Louis Cardinals' chances of taking over second place when they tallied three times in the 10th to win 4-1. The defeat left the third place Redbirds two percentage points behind the Dodgers and two games from the Braves.

The New York Giants moved into a virtual fourth place tie with Pittsburgh by defeating the Philadelphia Phillies, twice, 9-4 and 3-0. The second game was called in the Giants' half of the fifth because of rain.

Schmitz earned his 14th triumph as the Chicago Cubs trounced the Cincinnati Reds.

Seals Boost Coast League Lead; Oaks, Angelinos Split

The victories raised Seattle above the .500 mark for the first time in weeks.

Portland and Sacramento split their twin bill. The Beavers took the first, 8 to 3, and Sacramento the next, 4 to 1. Portland captured the series, five games to two. Di Biasi scored his 16th victory of the season in the opener. Freitas kept the Beavers scoreless until the final inning of the nightcap, when an unearned run spoiled his shutout.

Angelo, Hessel Defeat Holmback In Mat Tussle

Eric Holmback, the 262-pound behemoth from Seattle, failed to live up to his boast of being able to dispose of two lighter opponents in a 30-minute time limit Saturday night in the Roseburg Armory, and as a result forfeited \$300 put up in the ring against his opponents, Bruno Angelo and Gordon Hessel.

Holmback, matching brute strength and bulk against agility of the smaller wrestlers, succeeded in putting Angelo out of commission for the first fall after 13 minutes, but Hessel managed to weather the huge wrestler's thrusts by clever maneuvering to stay the remaining 17 minutes.

The huge ex-football player displayed his tremendous strength by breaking Hessel's full nelson holds by raising his arms and tensing his muscles time after time, and coming out of Hessel's headlocks, by merely picking the latter up bodily and slamming him to the floor.

Three times Hessel threw his full weight into Sonnenberg butts against the muscle man's stomach, only to be brushed off like a feather. However, an unexpected dropkick to Eric's chest, sent him sprawling on the canvas.

Angelo used different tactics against Holmback. In retaliation

for the latter's roughness, Angelo beat him to the floor with his fists several times. Holmback's favorite punishment inflictor was getting his opponent in a corner, then repeatedly slamming his massive bulk against him while Referee Elton Owen attempted to pull him off. Hessel solved this one, however, by quickly dropping to the floor between thrusts and crawling out between Holmback's legs.

Holmback showed considerable speed for a man of his size, but the lighter fellows easily sidestepped him to send him flying against the ropes or to the mat, when the big fellow would rush in for a hold.

Angelo laid prey to a body slam and body press, after being battered in the corner ropes. Hair pulling, slugging and every other form of dirty tactics went into the fray. On one occasion, when Eric was displaying his great strength after breaking Hessel's full nelson, Hessel drop kicked to the back and sent him through the ropes.

Other Results The preliminary bouts pitted Angelo against Danno MacDonald, Angelo took the first fall with a Boston crab after 6 minutes. The second fall went to MacDonald on a foul, when Bruno repeatedly choked his opponent, then engaged Referee Elton Owen in fisticuffs, until fans at the ringside grabbed the wrestler and dealt blows of their own. Angelo had to be escorted from the ring by deputies brandishing guns, but the crowd forgot all

about their hate for the villain, as they cheered him when he went up against Holmback in the final match. The two wrestlers then went the remaining minutes to a draw.

In the other 30-minute preliminary, Tiger Steve Nenoff took the only fall of a rugged combat with Hessel, with a punishing standing long arm bar after 20 minutes wrestling. Nenoff displayed surprising strength and stamina for a man of his age, and came out of slugs after the long end more than once. Hessel at one time grabbed both ends of Nenoff's long mustache as retaliation for Nenoff's hair pulling. He had the "Bully of the Balkins" practically shedding tears before Referee Owen finally broke Hessel's hold. The bout ended in a flurry of fisticuffs.
