

Springfield Edges Sutherlin Pastime Softballers, 7-6

One bad inning was the difference between victory and defeat for the Sutherlin-Roseburg Pastime softball team Saturday night when the Springfield district entry exploded with six runs in the second inning to post a 7-6 win at Roseburg.

Springburg's loss throws the district playoff into a tie. Both teams have won three and lost one in district play. Sutherlin Manager Goose Mardin said Saturday night that the final playoff game will be played in Drain Tuesday night. The decision was necessary because of the Springfield manager's refusal to play in Roseburg.

The first inning was all Roseburg as three hits and an error developed into three runs. To all appearances, the Pastimers were off on another one-sided win, as the opposing batters went down one, two, three in their half of the initial inning.

But the last of the second was a different story. Springfield's Richardson-Allyn nine jumped on Pitcher Ralph Montgomery for three hits and two walks. The only two Roseburg errors of the evening also helped push across those six runs. Although handicapped by a drizzling rain and some rare umpire decisions, the Taverniers harked away at that four-run lead in the last two innings to come within one run of tying the score. Again in the sixth, the Springfield club chased across a run. Two walks and a hit filled the bases and the runner scored on Lake's fly ball to left field.

Final Rally Nipped
Babe Wimberly started things off in the seventh, reaching first on a single and racing home on faulty handling of Lovell Baker's ground ball. Three doubles in a row paced the attack in the top of the eighth as Jim White doubled to right field, and scored on Fred Scherner's double along the left field foul line. Another double in left field by Wimberly scored Scherner but the rally died as Baker fled out to right field for the third out. Neither team could get a runner to first in their last batting attempt and the Richardson-Allyn Realtors walked off the field with the playoff-tying win.

The Pastimers did everything well except score, usually their strongest department. The locals could tally only six runs on three doubles and six singles. The Springfield team took advantage of six walks and six hits to chase across their winning margin. The two second-inning Roseburg errors proved costly. Both batters who reached base on errors later scored and two more Springfield runs were made by batters who had walked.

New Pastimes For Gunners Sought In Wildlife Scarcity

BOSTON—Hunting and Fishing Magazine is launching a \$1,000 nationwide "Shoot Contest" in its September issue. It is an attempt to discover shooting games capable of stimulating year-round interest in rifle, shotgun and pistol marksmanship. In 1926 the same publication promoted a similar contest which resulted in the creation of the increasingly-popular skeet.

Bernhard A. Roth, editor of Hunting and Fishing, together with leading conservationists and outdoor writers, predicts a scarcity of game in the next few years with a resultant tightening of bag limits and hunting seasons. Hunting and Fishing's search for new games is an attempt to lessen the tremendous pressure of the nation's wildlife resources and at the same time stimulate interest during non-hunting seasons.

"There is in the United States an army of 12,000,000 hunters, most of whom hunt only when they can get away from their homes and jobs during the few days of open season. In the last 12 years the average annual increase of hunters in the field has been 500,000. This terrific pressure has caused game populations to dwindle, and reduced seasons loom," explained Roth.

Thirty-nine prizes, worth a total of \$1,000, will be given contestants who submit the best games in the three divisions: rifle, shotgun and pistol. In the special essay section of the contest prizes will be given for the best "Tips to Follow Shooters."
