Roseburg's Umpqua Chiefs will host the visiting Drain baseball team on Finlay Field tonight. Game time is 8:30.

Although the Chiefs were rained out at Grants Pass last Sunday, the local ball club has scheduled a full week, beginning against Drain tonight. Chief Secretary Elmore Hill said yesterday that the Gold Beach team will visit Roseburg Thursday night for an exhibition game with the Chiefs on Finlay Field. 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Amateur Rodeo Preparations Underway at Myrtle Creek

Cowboys from Douglas County ranches will converge on Myrtle Creek Sunday and Monday, Sept. 5 and 6, to participate in the amateur rodeo to be sponsored there by the Myrtle Creek Saddle Pals. The rodeo grounds have been practically completed.

The two-day event will include a parade through Myrtle Creek's streets, to be sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce on Labor Day. Prizes will be awarded for the best floats, children's decorated bicycles, and costumes. Many riding clubs will be among the mounted units taking part.

At the rodeo, the food concession will be managed by the Myrtle Creek Lions Club. Souven-

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ir programs will be sold by the Boy Scouts.

The grounds, near Myrtle Creek's new Evergreen Park, include a fenced arena and corals, a judges stand, and grandstands to seat several hundred spectators.

A queen contest is being held in connection with the rodeo. Joanne Bryant, 14-year-old Myrtle Creek High School freshman, is the first to enter the contest under sponsorship of Tri-City merchants. Rose Arena, queen of the recent Riddle Rodeo, and Valerie Sparks, queen of the Roseburg Trail Dust Saddle Club Stampede, are also to ride.

Medical Aid From U. S. Boon to Suffering Greece

ATHENS, (AP)—More than \$1,250,000 worth of medical supplies brought into Greece by the American Mission the past year combated possible outbreaks of disease. Vaccines were used to immunize civil war refugees against typhoid, typhus and other diseases. Large quantities of medical supplies were also sent to guerrilla-stricken areas.

DDT insecticide was important in the American-Greek malaria program which American officials describe as "eminently successful." Malaria always has been a scourge in Greece. Before World War II there were normally between 1 and 2 million cases a year; in years with heavy rainfall there were between 2 and 3 million cases annually. During the past year the number of malaria cases were reduced to between 50,000 and 100,000.

To combat tuberculosis a team of vaccination experts has come to Greece from Denmark.

Blood Malady In Babies Yields To New Treatment

BUFFALO, N. Y., Aug. 24.—(AP)—A treatment to overcome a rare blood disease in babies was reported today to the International Congress on Hematology.

Babies born with this ailment are in danger of bleeding to death from wounds or cuts. Their blood lack fibrinogen, a substance that forms clots to stop bleeding. If bleeding started, there was nothing to stop it.

This lack can be overcome by giving the babies fibrinogen obtained from human blood, said Dr. Louis K. Diamond and W. Borges of the blood grouping laboratory of Boston and Harvard Medical School. Fibrinogen is one of the proteins produced when

blood is separated into its component parts.

They described successful treatment of three cases of the ailment, known as congenital afibrinogenemia. Dr. Diamond said the disease is extremely rare and has sometimes been mistaken for hemophilia, an inherited blood disease. The cause of the uncontrolled bleeding in hemophilia is not known.

New findings that ultimately may reduce the heavy toll of sudden death from blood clots that lodge in the heart, lungs or brain were described at the opening session of the four-day congress.

These findings deal with the intricate mechanism by which blood clots. A dozen or more potent body chemicals are involved, all in tiny amounts. Each has an "enemy" that works against it. When bleeding starts, some go to work to form clots to stop the bleeding. But others work to prevent too much clotting, or to halt it when the bleeding stops.

Elderly Bandon Woman Killed in Auto Upset

McMINNVILLE, Aug. 24.—(AP)—Mrs. Mary Wahl, 66, of Bandon, was killed near Gopher Valley today when her car overturned in loose gravel.
