

Notice of Timber Sale

Sealed bids, marked outside "Bid for Timber" and addressed to the Regional Administrator, Bureau of Land Management, Region I, Swan Island Administration Building, Portland 18, Oregon, will be received until and opened at 10:30 a. m., daylight savings time, Sept. 14, 1948, for the purchase of all merchantable timber designated for cutting upon tracts hereinafter described: the cutting and removal of the timber to be carried out in accordance with the forest practice rules approved on July 7, 1938, by the Secretary of the Interior. Each bid must state the amount per thousand feet, board measure, that will be paid for each species and the total consideration which will be paid for the timber. No bid for less than the appraised value will be considered. Each bid must be submitted in duplicate and be accompanied by a deposit. The deposit must be in the form of a certified check on a solvent bank and in favor of the Treasurer of the United States. The amount of the deposit will be \$5,000.00 provided the total amount bid is over \$5,000.00 and less than \$50,000.00; it will be \$10,000.00 provided the total amount bid is over \$50,000.00 and less than \$100,000.00; it will be 10% of the amount bid when the bid exceeds \$100,000.00. If the total amount bid is less than \$5,000.00, the deposit shall be the amount of the bid. The deposit will be returned to unsuccessful bidders; applied as part of the purchase price of the successful bidder; or that portion of the deposit, representing the minimum required by law, shall be retained as liquidated damages if the high bidder does not execute contract and furnish satisfactory bond within thirty days of acceptance of the bid or cannot furnish evidence of his ability to comply with the local marketing requirement. This evidence must be submitted with the bid and shall conform with the requirements as set forth in this advertisement. In sales over \$10,000.00, the successful bidder will be required to furnish a sworn financial statement, in duplicate, showing ability to fulfill the terms of the contract.

A bond on all sales will be required in an amount computed at the rate of at least 20 per cent of the first \$10,000.00 of the bid, plus 10 per cent of any additional amount of the bid in excess of \$10,000.00. Payment for timber will be required in advance of cutting, payment in full at the time of filing the contract being required in sales amounting to \$10,000.00 or less. In larger sales, at the option of the Regional Administrator, payment may be made in a number of installments scheduled to keep pace with the rate of timber cutting and payable upon demand from the Regional Administrator. The right is hereby reserved to waive technical defects in this advertisement; to reject all bids, or to award the timber for the amount of the highest bid to other than the highest bidder when necessary, pursuant to the Act of August 28, 1937 (50 Stat. 874), in order to provide a continued supply of timber to local industry and contribute to permanence of the community which is dependent upon such industry. **STREET WIDENING PROPOSED**—The widening of Military Street from the Oak Street Bridge to Corey Avenue was recommended by the City Planning Commission and approved by the City Council this week. The aerial photo above, taken prior to the recent war, shows Military Street at the bridge, Corey Avenue going toward the high school, and Harvard Avenue going west. The picture does not show the more recently constructed Coen's houses adjacent to the high school nor other improvements in the vicinity. The two sharp turns that traffic must take proceeding from the bridge to Harvard Avenue have been discussed from time to time and various solutions proposed. Mosher Street, also approved for widening, is not seen in the above picture.

**Contempt Citation Against Typos Asked by NLRB**  
WASHINGTON, Aug. 25.—(AP)—The NLRB general counsel's office today asked that the International Typographical Union be held in contempt of court for insisting on closed shop contracts.  
The union is under a five-month old injunction against negotiating such agreements, outlawed by the Taft-Hartley Act.  
In a critical move against the ITU in its fight to keep the closed shop, the National Labor Relations Board's prosecuting agency charged the Union's top officers with having disobeyed and disregarded the injunction.  
The restraining order was issued March 27 by Judge Luther M. Swygert at Indianapolis. It was there that Robert N. Denham sent his formal petition that the Union be cited for contempt.  
Carroll Martin, an NLRB attorney, filed the petition this morning.  
Martin said Judge Swygert indicated he would decide "in a day or two" whether to order the union into court to show cause why it should not be adjudged in contempt.  
The petition asked that the AFL union be stopped immediately from giving any further support—including all important strike benefit payments—to the striking printers on Chicago and Hammond, Ind., newspapers. The ITU members there have been on strike since last November 24.  
Papers are printed without ITU help by using a new photo engraving process, for typewritten copy. How long the Chicago strike could continue without the aid of the international union is a question.  
Henry Kaiser, attorney for the ITU, issued a statement calling the NLRB move a "crude and dangerous perversion of the administrative process."  
The ITU contends Senator Taft (R-Ohio) has "pressured" Denham's office to bring the contempt action. Denham denied that.  
**Wildlife Research Unit Organized at Amherst**  
WASHINGTON, Aug. 25.—(AP)—A cooperative wildlife research unit, similar to one at Oregon State College and 14 other schools, has been organized at the

University of Massachusetts, Amherst, Mass.  
The units are financed jointly by the land grant colleges, state game commissions, the wildlife management institute and the fish and game wildlife service.  
The Oregon state unit, directed by Arthur S. Einarson, is concerned with research in pheasant management.
