## Game Paradise Develops in Area Where Lewis and Clark Hungered

SPOKANE, Aug. 21.—(AP)—A pair of weary gents sat by a small campfire in the mountains of Central Idaho one night 143 years ago munching on a steak.

They did not like the steak and had even fewer kind words for their surroundings.

One reason for their despondency was that they were tired of steak. Perhaps the first reason was that the morsels of meat had been carved from the fat test of their bony string of pack horses.

The doleful gentlemen were Meriwether Lewis and William Clark, who had been commissioned by Congress and President Thomas Jefferson to explore a land route to the Pacific Ocean through the Northwest Territory.

They were hungry and had all they wanted of the country that was to become Central Idaho. They said so in a report which followed the pack horse phase of their diet.

Historians report their remarks as:

"There is no living creature in these mountains, except for a few small pheasants, a type of gray squirrel and a blue bird of the vulture type." They also noted that guns were "of little service" and the small animals were extremely hard to shoot.

Game Abundant Today  
Those rugged souls would be in for an eye-opener if they returned to the scene of their laments today.

The small stream they labeled "Hungry Creek" lies in the center of a big game area where 3,437 elk were killed last year. Nearly 1000 of the broad antlered animals — many of them weighing 1000 pounds — were taken in a special hunt to keep the herd from outgrowing the available range.

On those heavily timbered slopes where those explorers tramped, tightening their belts as they went in 1805, more than

half of the state's kill of 6544 elk were taken in 1947.

It just wasn't a case of bad eyesight with the early travelers. Big game authorities say there were probably very few animals in the area at that time. They say the dense forests kept the kind of feed the elk wanted from growing on ground there, and that the herds gathered on the plains and meadows where the grass was high.

Fire Proves Benefactor.

Foresters shudder when it is mentioned, but fire brought the elk herds to central Idaho. Forest fires, the natural enemy of wild game, was in this case the benefactor. (The Forest Service objects to people setting fires to grow their own elk herds.)

Millions of acres were blackened as fire swept over the hills in years past. In its wake followed the brushy undergrowth and weeds that come after every mountain fire. As civilization pushed the wild game herds farther into the mountains, the elk found this country and liked it. In recent years, the state of Idaho took a hand and established an 800-square mile game preserve (1917) to protect the elk from poachers and hunters out for a set of elk teeth to hang on a gold chain.

In 1935 the State Game Department opened the reserve for a special hunt to keep the animals from eating themselves out of a home. The hunters are chosen each year by lot. Entries from all over the nation cast their names in the hat with the hope they'll be one of the lucky ones.
