

## Stojack, Angelo Dated for Title Match at Armory

Bruno Angelo, rugged Italian wrestling villain who put up such a brilliant battle against 262-pound Eric Holmback of Seattle here last Saturday night, will engage Frankie Stojack, Tacoma stylist, in a Pacific Coast junior heavyweight title match at the Roseburg Armory Saturday night.

The coast title tilt will feature Matchmaker Don Owen's weekly mat show, and another capacity crowd is anticipated. Douglas County fans are warned to make early-week ring-side seat reservations at Powell's.

In another one-hour battle, Tiger Nenoff, the "Bully of the Balkans," will engage Danno MacDonald, flashy young British grappler.

Stojack, former Washington State College football lineman and intercollegiate mat champion for the Cougars, regained his coast crown in Eugene recently by defeating Al Szaaz, talented young Hungarian who held the crown for a few weeks following an upset registered in Washington some weeks ago.

Angelo, before losing to Holmback, wrestled a two-fall draw with MacDonald—losing the only fall to Danno on a technicality. Starting Pitcher Ralph Montgomery gave up six hits and four runs before leaving the mound in favor of Ralph Sanstede in the fourth inning. The Realtors hit just about everything that came over the plate in their half of the initial inning as the first three men scored. Again in the fourth, Springfield scored when Pitcher Basil Wilson tripled and tallied a moment later on a fly to left field. The timely hitting shortstop sent the Sox back into first place last night when he poled a dramatic ninth inning home run with one mate aboard to give Boston a thrilling 9-8 victory over the Cleveland Indians. The triumph pushed the Sox half a game in front of the Indians. The Red Sox knocked out Satchel Paige with a two-run rally in the third.

The Boston Braves increased their first place hold in the National League to three and a half games over runner-up St. Louis, defeating the Cardinals, 9-3. The victory, Boston's fourth in a row, also put the Braves four games ahead of the third place Brooklyn Dodgers, who were whipped by the Pirates, 9-1.

Sain had an easy time winning his 16th game as the Braves pounded Harry and three relievers for 18 hits.

Musial hit his 31st home run with one on in the first.

Kiner walloped his 33rd home run and Westlake his 13th to help the Pirates subdue the Dodgers. The New York Giants remained in a virtual fourth place tie with Pittsburgh, six games off the pace, by defeating the last place Chicago Cubs, 7-4. Sid Gordon led a 12-hit assault on five pitchers with a double and two singles.

The third place New York Yankees failed to better their two-game deficit in the American League when they were nosed out by the cellar-dwelling Chicago White Sox, 6-5.

So parachuting was tested for the first time last week. It worked.

The beavers drop out of the plane in a small box that opens automatically when it hits the ground. The parachute is opened when a box leaves the plane.

Some facts and figures on Krell and Marsters... Bob Krell plays center with '45, '46 and '47 varsity experience. Weighs 195 lbs., 6' 2" tall, 21 years old and now a senior. Bill Marsters is a sophomore with '47 freshman left guard experience. Weighs 220 lbs., 6' 1" in height and 18 years old.

Press Book says... "Bob Krell is a three-year letterman who should have his best year after a mediocre campaign in 1947. Looked very good in spring practice. Strong man on defense with the ability to back up the line and cover plenty of territory. Bill Marsters is a sophomore who has the size and movement to become a top flight guard when he gains experience. Played for the freshmen last fall after completing an outstanding prep career at Roseburg high."

Here is some history about Oregon State's football team since the first game in 1883. Played 388 games, won 211, lost 141, tied 36. The Orange and Black scored 5617 points against 3005 by their opponents. Played in the Rose Bowl once. In 51 games against the University of Oregon, they have won 18, lost 26 and tied 7.
