R. L. Preston Pallbearer At Snellstrom Funeral

Richard L. Preston of Roseburg was among six former department commanders of the Veterans of Foreign Wars who served as active pallbearers at the funeral of State Representative John Snellstrom in Eugene today.

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2-4-D Effective As Late Summer Killer of Weeds

There's no reason why 2-4-D cannot be used in the late summer or fall.

While the weed chemical does have many uses in growing crops during the early spring and summer months, its use is not restricted to that season of the year, reminds Rex Warren, O.S.C. extension farm crops specialist. L. a. w. n. s., for instance, may be sprayed during the late summer with reasonable assurance of success in getting a kill on such troublesome broad-leaf weeds as plantain and dandelion.

Warren says he is frequently asked how long it takes after 2-4-D is applied before plants may be wetted by rain or irrigation water without interfering with the work of the chemical. Three or four hours after actual spraying, he says, is all the

time necessary for the 2-4-D to have in order to affect the plant. By the time the spray has dried on the plant, he adds, is usually time enough for the chemical to get in its death dealing work. Several weeks may pass, however, before such plants as plantain or dandelion will be completely dead. First signs of 2-4-D effectiveness is usually a twisting and unnatural curling of the leaves, Warren states.

For use on lawns which are bordered by ornamental flowers and shrubs, Warren suggests that the salt or amine types of 2-4-D be used. The ester or alcohol base 2-4-D is highly volatile and drifts badly in the slightest breeze, Warren points out. This is objectionable because surrounding plants are frequently damaged.

The best rule to follow in using any of the many manufactured forms of 2-4-D is to follow closely the directions printed on the container, Warren emphasizes. Dosage rates while seemingly low are effective.

Warm water brings the quickest reaction to 2-4-D.

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
