

## Bosox Recapture League Lead By Beating Indians

The Boston Red Sox yesterday recaptured first place from the Cleveland Indians in their tense struggle for the American League flag, defeating the Tribe 8-4. A five-run eighth inning rally, which included Doerr's three-run homer, snapped a 3-3 tie and shored the Red Sox a half game in front of the Indians. Southpaw Farnell went the distance, yielding 10 hits for his 10th victory; Bearden was the loser.

Trailing 2-1 in the last of the eighth, and held to two hits, the New York Yankees pounced on Moulder, who had replaced starter Papish, for five runs to defeat the Chicago White Sox 6-2. A two-run triple by Johnson with two out drove in the winning runs.

The fourth place Philadelphia Athletics turned back the Detroit Tigers, 4-3, hanging the 10th de feat upon Newhouser. Trailing 3-2 in the eighth, the A's drove Newhouser from the mound, scoring two runs on a double by Suder to give Coleman his 12th victory. The A's are three and a half games out of first place.

Stewart squeezed home Kozar with the run that gave the Washington Senators an 8-7 victory

over the St. Louis Browns. The Browns had a 7-1 lead at one time, but the NATS pecked away, finally tying the score with four runs in the seventh.

**Braves' Lead Reduced**  
The National League race tightened considerably when the cellar-dwelling Chicago Cubs upset the Boston Braves twice, 5-1 and 5-2, to reduce their first place lead to two and a half games over the St. Louis Cardinals. The Redbirds moved into second place, a half game in front of the Brooklyn Dodgers, by sweeping a doubleheader from the New York Giants, 7-2 and 7-3.

Musial's home run with one on in the last of the ninth off Trinkle broke a 5-5 tie in the nightcap. Slaughter had smashed a two-run homer earlier in the game. Rookie Southpaw Ken Johnson picked up the victory in relief.

The Brooklyn Dodgers humbled the Cincinnati Reds for the 14th time in 17 meetings as Hatten pitched the Brooks to a 6-1 triumph over the Redlegs. It was Brooklyn's ninth win without a loss at Crosley Field, and Hatten's fifth over the Reds. He allowed only seven hits for his 10th triumph. Reese clouted a two-run homer off lower Peterson.

Ralph Kiner, making his second stab in two seasons at Babe Ruth's record of 60 home runs, is ahead of his pace of a year ago when he crashed 51 round trippers.

The slugging outfielder of the Pittsburgh Pirates yesterday banged his 35th round-tripper in his team's first 115 games to help the Bucs sweep a doubleheader from the Philadelphia Phillies, 11-4 and 4-1. The twin triumph enabled the Pirates to regain fourth place from the New York Giants by a full game.

Pittsburgh, with 60 victories and 52 defeats, trails the league leading Boston Braves by 4 1/2 games.

## Tiger Nenoff To Battle MacDonald On Next Mat Bill

Tiger Nenoff, the grappling villain with the flowing black mustache, not only proved to Douglas County wrestling followers that he was the "Bully of the Balkans," but also a brand new scourge for any matman in the Pacific Northwest during his current campaign.

The Bulgarian disposed of Gordon Hessel, talented New Mexico ace, as pretty as you please in last week's special attraction here, and Saturday night at the Roseburg Armory he will be making his second local appearance—against Danno MacDonald.

MacDonald, extremely popular young Britisher, is a scientific matman who employs drop-kicks and backbreaker holds to good advantage and may cause Nenoff more trouble than he anticipates. The match, over a one-hour route, will open the show at 8:30 p. m.—and a near-capacity crowd is expected to be on hand.

Attracting most of the crowd will be the Pacific Coast junior heavyweight championship skirmish between Frankie Stojack, Tacoma, and Bruno Angelo, Italian matman.

Because of the pressure Salvatore Flores, Mexican matman, will replace Elton Owen as referee of both bouts. Flores, a licensed wrestling referee, is considered one of the best in the business.

Angelo, who claimed the world title recently, may find himself in an unusual position for a villain—the favorite. At least local fans were shouting for him last week when he staged that grand battle against Erick Holmbeck, the Seattle heavyweight who held a weight advantage of nearly 80 pounds. While Bruno, who specializes in a Japanese long arm-bar, will be meeting an opponent of his own size, Stojack also possesses more speed and agility than the 262-pounder.

Most feared maneuver employed by Stojack is an airplane spin he can use more than 100 times without making himself groggy—but makes his opponent virtually helpless.

Matchmaker Don Owen is anticipating a crowd equal to the capacity attendance of last week's Donnybrook.

Next Monday and Tuesday afternoons at 3 o'clock, high school grid aspirants will draw their equipment and actual practice sessions are slated to begin Wednesday, September 1.

However, the coach points to the rough playing schedule for the year and bemoans the lack of practice time. The nine-game schedule finds the Roseburg Indians opening the season against Medford's Black Tornado at Medford. The Indians meet opponents on every succeeding Friday and wind up the season at home against Ashland on Armistice Day, Nov. 11.

Roseburg's four-man coaching staff is anxious to have all varsity and B squad candidates turn out next Monday and Tuesday to draw equipment. Until school starts, practice sessions will be held under the lights, beginning Wednesday night.

PORTLAND, Aug. 27.—(AP)—The weekend fishing outlook was rather unpromising yesterday with excellent angling expected only in Willowa county and a few other scattered areas.

The state game commission's fishing bulletin included:

**Willamette Valley:**  
Lane County—Eugene—Fishing on McKenzie River and tributaries, fair. Linton and Clear Lakes, spotty. Prospects for weekend fair. Water conditions, excellent.

**Coastal section:**  
Coos County—Fishing is about the same as last week. Few sea-run cutthroat are being taken. Fall run salmon fishing has been slow in the Coquille River.

**Douglas County—Reedsport:**  
Coastal streams producing light catches of sea-run cutthroats and salmon.

**Southern Oregon:**  
Rogue River System—Trout fishing is expected to be only fair in the Rogue River and its tributaries. Waters have raised with rains and slightly roil. Salmon fishing fair to good in taws and bay at the mouth of the Rogue. Steelhead fishing is improving at

Agness and Ilahee. Diamond Lake—Trolling and bait fishing poor to fair. Fly fishing improving.

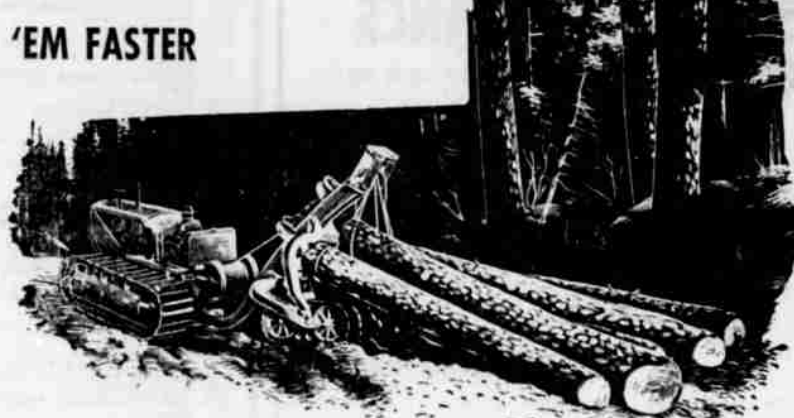
