

Pupils in First Grade Must Take Physical Exams

Parents who will take their youngsters to school for the first time this autumn were reminded today of the age limits and health examinations required for first grade pupils, by Mrs. Lula C. Gorrell, county school superintendent.

To enter the first grade this year, children must reach the age of six years on or before Nov. 15. After that date, children becoming six years old must wait until next year before entering the first grade.

"Many educators feel that this age is too early for many children to enter school," Mrs. Gorrell pointed out. "Children who become six in the autumn will be competing with children who are several months older in the first grade. Sometimes serious maladjustments in later school years result."

According to the new health program recently instituted by the legislature, Mrs. Gorrell also said, children entering the first and ninth grades are to have medical examinations, either through a school project or by family doctors.

Red Workers Found In U. S. Army Headquarters

SEOUL, Aug. 27 — (AP) — The U. S. Army disclosed today it had unearthed a Communist cell in its 24th Corps headquarters at the Hanto Hotel.

An announcement said 24 Koreans were arrested and 13 of them had been sentenced to jail. Most of the Koreans were dining room employees.

The Army said there was no evidence of spying, but the employees had been distributing leaflets in support of the Russian-sponsored government of North Korea.

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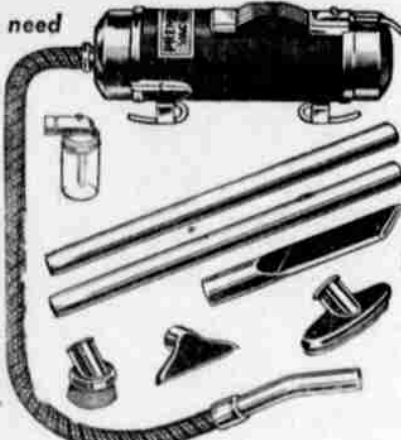
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
